

# Londonin

Move over, Paris - London is the city of love and romance. Neil Simpson tells you why

ith so many centuries of history under its belt, London has a lot of love stories worthy of St Valentine's attention. As Prince Harry and Meghan Markle plan their spring wedding, we're retelling some of the city's epic relationships - both world-famous and lesser-known - and revealing where they happened.

#### PRINCE HARRY AND **MEGHAN MARKLE**

#### Nottingham Cottage, Kensington

Nestled in the grounds of Kensington Palace, Harry and Meghan's love nest seems quaint and simple but, this being the royal family, the cottage was designed by Sir Christopher Wren, one of Britain's most renowned architects. We wouldn't expect anything less. www.hrp.org.uk

#### PAUL AND LINDA MCCARTNEY

#### Old Marylebone Town Hall, Marylebone

The Beatle and the photographer met at Soho's Bag O'Nails club in 1967, parallel to the epicentre of London's Swinging Sixties scene, Carnaby Street. The club is still open, for members only, but for





Beatles fans, it's worth visiting to see the commemorative plaque in the doorway. In 1969, Paul and Linda were married at Old Marylebone Town Hall, which has just emerged from a major interior refurbishment. Breast cancer took Linda's life in 1998, and in 2011 Paul returned to the town hall to marry Nancy Shevell. The hall has also witnessed the weddings of Ringo Starr, Liam Gallagher and Antonio Banderas to Melanie Griffith. If you'd like a free tour of the Sir Edwin Cooper-designed, 1920s hall, note that you need to book in advance. www.westminster. gov.uk/old-marylebone-town-hall

#### OSWALD LAURENCE AND MARGARET MCCOLLUM

**Embankment Station, Charing Cross** This tale of London love may not be between two famous figures, but it might be the most beautiful story: actor Oswald Laurence and doctor Margaret McCollum were married for

15 years and lived together in north London. During his career, Oswald recorded the famous 'mind the gap' message for the Northern line, but after 40 years London Underground reduced its use until it was only played at Embankment Station, Oswald died in 2007 and Margaret regularly visited the station to hear his voice, but in 2012 Transport for London (TfL) replaced the recording. Margaret contacted TfL, which arranged for a CD recording of Oswald's 'mind the gap' message to be sent to her. TfL was so touched by the story that in March 2013, it reintroduced Oswald's voice to Embankment Station, where you can still hear it today. www.tfl.gov.uk

#### RUTH AND RICHARD ROGERS

#### The River Café. Hammersmith

One of London's most iconic restaurants has a love story at its heart, which began almost half a century ago: design student Ruth Elias met architect Richard in 1969, and they married four years later. In 1987, Ruth partnered up with her friend Rose Gray to open

#### ROMANTIC LONDON

The River Café in Hammersmith, an Italian restaurant designed by Richard. It was founded primarily to feed the staff at Richard's nearby architectural practice, and for decades, he and Ruth would walk back and forth to see each other every day. As the years have passed, the restaurant has become a London institution and although Richard has been forced to move his practice out of the neighbourhood, their love story continues. www.rivercafe.co.uk

#### QUEEN VICTORIA AND PRINCE ALBERT Victoria and Albert Museum. South Kensington

Arguably the biggest London love story of them all, Victoria and Albert's epic bond is in evidence on a grand scale in the city: the Victoria and Albert Museum was just one of the museums on Kensington's Exhibition Road built by Albert (the area's 19th-century nickname was 'Albertopolis'). The Science Museum, the Natural History Museum and more were all funded using the huge profits generated by his Great Exhibition of 1851. The money intended for building the Royal Albert Hall was diverted by Victoria following Albert's death in 1861, so that she could use it to build the Albert Memorial just across the road - following Albert's death, Victoria famously wore nothing but black for the rest of her life. www.vam.ac.uk

#### GILBERT & GEORGE

#### Spitalfields Market, Shoreditch

Originally from Plymouth, Devon, George Passmore met his Italian husband Gilbert Prousch in 1967, when the pair began studying sculpture at Saint Martin's School of Art (which is now part of the Central Saint Martins arts school). They have been inseparable ever since, as an artistic partnership that believes in 'art for all'. Together Gilbert & George won the Turner Prize in 1986, counted David Bowie as a customer and also enjoyed Tate Modern's largest artist retrospective exhibition in 2007. The couple married in 2008 and have lived in a restored 18th-century house on Fournier Street in Spitalfields since 1968. Embark on a shopping trip to Spitalfields Market and you might just spot them. www.gilbertandgeorge.co.uk



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#### ROMANTIC LONDON

#### JOHN KEATS AND FANNY BRAWNE

#### Keats House, Hampstead

It seems only right that one of English literature's greatest Romantic poets had an equally romantic (and tragic) love story. In pursuit of a healthier lifestyle, John and his two brothers moved from the City of London to Hampstead in 1817, when John was 22 years old. He moved into the smaller half of a house called Wentworth Place in 1818, and soon after the Brawne family moved into the larger half. John quickly fell in love with their eldest daughter, Fanny, and they became engaged in 1819. When John became ill with tuberculosis, he wrote letters to Fanny, despite the fact that she lived just next door. John died less than two years later and these days, you can tour the Georgian villa where he met the love of his life. www.cityof london.gov.uk/things-to-do/keats-house

#### PRINCE WILLIAM AND KATE MIDDLETON

#### Westminster Abbey, Westminster

There was a time during the credit crunch when it was rumoured that Will and Kate would have a low-key wedding. In April 2011, however, the second in line to the British throne married

in front of 1,900 guests, fulfilling the fairytale wedding dreams of royalists all over the world. Will and Kate met at the University of St Andrews in Scotland in 2001, but the capital is very much their home now - the couple live in Kensington Palace. www.westminster-abbey.org

#### DANA INGROVÁ AND EMIL ZATOPEK Wembley Stadium, Wembley

This athletic couple were born on exactly the same day in the former Czechoslovakia, but didn't meet each other until they were competing in the London Olympic Games in 1948. Emil was a runner and Dana a javelin thrower, and they both broke their personal best records on the day they met. During the Games at Wembley, Emil won two medals (5,000m silver and 10,000m gold) and by the time the 1948 Games were over, Emil and Dana were engaged. The couple continued to compete together and were married for 52 years, until Emil passed away in 2000. www.wembleystadium.com

If you want to live like a local, grab a seat at one of these tables and enjoy traditional British dishes, from fish and chips to a Sunday roast, says **Sarah Riches** 

#### **PANCAKES**

For more than 500 years, Pancake Day, or Shrove Tuesday (13 Feb), has been a traditional day of feasting in England, invented so that people could use up eggs and fats before fasting in the run-up to Easter. Celebrate this ritual at Crème de la Crèpe in Covent Garden, where you can enjoy pancakes filled with British favourites such as Heinz baked beans. www.cremedelacrepe.co.uk

#### FISH AND CHIPS

Probably the UK's most recognised national dish, battered fish and chips were first served in the 1800s - Charles Dickens mentioned fried fish in Oliver Twist in 1839. Until the 1980s, they were served in old newspaper, and they're usually eaten with your fingers. Try them with salt and vinegar, tomato ketchup, mushy peas, pickled onions and gherkins, topped with gravy, cheese or curry sauce. Pat 'Pop' Newland - the man behind Poppie's - started his career in the chippy trade aged 11, in 1952. The Spitalfields and Camden branches rock a 1950s vibe, with music hall songs and memorabilia from Pop's childhood on display, including Chopper bikes and Space Hoppers. You can also try jellied eels, a traditional dish loved by East Enders over the centuries. www.poppiesfishandchips.co.uk

#### ENGLISH BREAKFAST

The cooked breakfast, or fry up, dates back to the 1300s when the upper classes would demonstrate their wealth to visitors during breakfast feasts. It took on its current form during the Industrial Revolution, when the masses needed to fill up before work. Riding House Café's Full English has two fried eggs, a free-range pork sausage, bacon, baked beans, mushrooms and tomatoes. www.ridinghouse.cafe

#### SUNDAY ROAST

King Henry VIII's bodyguards were so fond of beef they were nicknamed Beefeaters, a name still used today. Their habit of eating Yorkshire puddings as a cheap, filling starter and then roast beef on Sunday after church soon spread. Today, most pubs serve roast beef and potatoes with seasonal vegetables, savoury Yorkshire puddings and gravy. Roast by Borough Market serves 48-day dry-aged roast sirloin served with Yorkshire pudding, rosemary 'roasties' and horseradish cream. For a modern take, pop by Yorkshire Burrito in Soho, which sells the whole shebang - slow-cooked beef, stuffing, roast potatoes and red wine gravy - wrapped in a giant Yorkshire pudding. www.roast-restaurant.com; www.yorkshireburrito.com





#### BANGERS AND MASH

When meat was in short supply during World War I, water and cereal were added to sausages to bulk them up - making them sizzle or 'bang' in the frying pan. This led to the nickname bangers and mash, or sausages and mashed potato. The sausages are often made from pork and drenched with onion gravy. Try the dish at Mother Mash off Carnaby Street, Choose mash made with milk and butter, Cheddar cheese, mustard or onions: a pork or lamb banger, flavoured with herbs, and red wine, onion or veggie gravy. www.mothermash.co.uk

#### SHEPHERD'S PIE

While it's not really a pie, or filled pastry, a typical shepherd's pie is made with minced mutton or lamb, chopped carrots and onions and topped with mashed potato made crispy in the oven the ultimate comfort food. It's often confused with cottage pie, which is made with minced beef topped with sliced potatoes. Cheap and filling, cottage pie was made by peasants in

cottages - hence the name - and was eaten 100 years before shepherd's pie. You can try both in most pubs, while shepherd's pie is available at The Bridge House, a gastropub with a real fireplace and piano by Tower Bridge. www.bridgehousebar.co.uk

#### TREACLE TART

Traditionally, this sticky dessert was popular with the lower classes, as it used cheap ingredients - bread and thick, black treacle - but golden syrup has been used instead of treacle since the dish was invented in the 1880s. Today, it's made by pouring golden syrup, lemon juice and breadcrumbs into shortcrust pastry, and served with cream or custard. A popular pudding at school, it features in Harry Potter, while the Child Catcher in Chitty Chitty Bang Bang used it to tempt children into a cage. Canteen, which makes classic British dishes such as pies on site in the Royal Festival Hall and Spitalfields, serves treacle tart with clotted cream. www.canteen.co.uk

#### CRUMBLE

A hot dessert is just what you need in winter, so why not try a traditional crumble, made with stewed fruit topped with a blend of oats, sugar, flour and butter? The Café in the Crypt, a hidden spot with brick-vaulted ceilings and tombstones beneath St Martin-in-the-Fields in Trafalgar Square, has a daily crumble - try apple, blackberry or blueberry, served with custard. www.stmartin-in-the-fields.org

#### BREAD AND BUTTER PUDDING

A dessert made with stale bread and nicknamed the poor man's pudding doesn't sound appealing. but this dish from the 1200s is really tasty. Once popular with the lower classes, it's now served on modern menus. Recipes vary, but usually include bread, rum-soaked raisins and custard, flavoured with nutmeg, cinnamon and orange or lemon zest. Try it at The English Restaurant by Spitalfields Market. www.theenglishrestaurant.com



Try a regional dish, even if you don't travel out of the capital.

Cornish pasty Half-moonshaped pastries stuffed with beef and root vegetables: cheese and onion or chicken and mushroom. Try one at the West Cornwall Pasty Co. www.westcornwallpasty.co.uk Eccles cakes Named after Eccles in Greater Manchester, these flat, circular pastries are filled with currants and dusted with sugar. Try them at St John Bar & Restaurant Smithfield, St John Bread and Wine or St John Maltby, with or without Lancashire cheese, or from its bakery at weekends. www.stjohngroup.uk.com

Welsh rarebit A South


Wales staple, this is cheese on toast, flavoured with ale, mustard or Worcestershire sauce. Try it with brown ale at the Old Red Cow. a traditional pub with church pews near the Museum of

Eccles London. The cakes pub also serves Scotch eggs, Sunday roast, fish and chips and sticky toffee pudding. www.theoldredcow.com

#### Melton Mowbray pork pie

Made in Melton Mowbray in Leicestershire, this pork-filled pastry was created in the 1700s so it could be carried to work or on a hunt. The pastry was originally discarded before jelly was added to preserve the meat and prevent the pie from crumbling. Try one at Mrs King's Pork Pies at Borough Market. www.boroughmarket.org.uk













Chinatown

With so many restaurants packed into one small area, Chinatown is a great place to head to if you're hungry. Leyla Kazim of the food and travel blog The Cutlery Chronicles picks her favourites.

#### Food House

This energetic and bustling restaurant on Gerrard Street with 風味食堂 above the door (translating to Food House) is a hub for fiery Sichuan specialities. Its huge bowl of wide and hearty handmade noodles smothered in chilli oil with tender lamb is the stuff dreams are made of.

#### Good Friend

From this small takeaway joint on Little Newport Street, you'll find Taiwan's iconic hammered and

fried chicken breast - and it's a mighty size. Light and crunchy, get it dusted with a powdered seasoning for an addictive cheap treat on the move.

#### Golden Gate Cake Shop

It's hard not to marvel at the 80 types of cakes available at this Cantonese bakery on Macclesfield Street. There's a lot to choose from, but for a sweet fix I can't resist its terrific creamy custard buns. Soft and pillowy bread conceals the sweet and rich filling.

Warning: don't be surprised if you scoff two in one sitting.

#### Four Seasons

The Chinatown outposts (on Gerrard Street and Wardour Street) of this small group of Cantonese restaurants are perfect spots to sample some of the best roast duck in town. The grain-fed free-range birds yield juicy flesh and exquisite crispy skin, seasoned with a secret blend of spices. I've hardly eaten Cantonese roast duck anywhere else since my first visit.

#### C&R Cafe

You will find classic Malaysian fare inside this relaxed restaurant in Rupert Court, with a fan base that even includes one of the country's harshest food critics: The Guardian newspaper's Jay Rayner. Don't miss the delicious Penang staple of buttery and flaky roti with a glorious curry dipping sauce for an excellent light bite. This is pretty much as good as the ones that I enjoyed when I visited Penang a couple of years ago!







#### Experimental Cocktail Club

Hidden behind an unassuming black door on Gerrard Street, you will find one of the most exciting bars in London and a place you would not expect to find in the depths of Chinatown. With an arresting interior and a thrilling stock of vintage and hardto-source spirits, its classic Negroni is quite unlike any other. Expect 1970s Campari and gin hailing from the 1950s. This is one of my favourite places to visit, as it feels as though you are time travelling via the medium of cocktails. Make sure you get in touch and book a table in advance to avoid disappointment - it is very popular.

#### Little Wooden Hut

Representing regional dishes from across China, Little Wooden Hut on Lisle Street may be tiny, but I love how its menu packs a serious punch. The Chongqing noodles, with a bright red chilli oil soup base laced with prickly Sichuan pepper, stampede across your tastebuds.

#### Rasa Sayang

Specialising in Malaysian and Singaporean cuisine, this halal venue on Macclesfield Street does Hainanese chicken rice - Singapore's national dish - so well. Do not stray from the soft poached chicken and fragrant rice as it is comfort food in its truest form.

#### Bake

This epicentre of pan-Asian baked goods on Wardour Street isn't a place in which to exercise restraint. I tend to leave with a few items, but never without its version of Japanese

taiyaki in hand. A fishshaped waffle cone filled with matchaice cream, it's a bestseller for a good reason. For London areas and the #SeeMoreLondon campaign, go to www. visitlondon.com/areas



n February, there's no escaping the fact that London is in the throes of winter: the trees of Hyde Park stand bare, creaking pubs stoke their fireplaces and only the heftiest coat will keep you warm. We wouldn't blame you if your thoughts turn to hotter climes, but head to Kew this month and you'll find the best of both worlds.

Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew is unveiling its 23rd

Orchids Festival (from 10 Feb; p. 28), which is dedicated to Thailand. The country has been picked because it has 1,100 species of orchid ('gluay mhai' in Thai).

Orchids are becoming endangered faster than they can be classified and protected. They remain one of the most widely traded plants in the world - in 2015, 42 per cent of the plants seized at Heathrow Airport were wild

orchids. This festival is a wonderful way to raise awareness, as well as to enjoy these beautiful plants.

The Princess of Wales Conservatory displays handmade Thai umbrellas and hanging bouquets, creating a stunning 'orchid palace'.

Orchid Lates, the evening events programme, includes traditional Thai dance, cookery and cocktail classes, and

> learning sessions with orchid experts.

As well as the finest orchids, the Princess of Wales Conservatory houses plants from 10 different climate zones, so don't forget to

explore these while you're inside. Highlights include the Titan Arum, one of the largest flowering plants in the world, which emits a disgusting odour similar to rotting meat to attract flies. - Neil Simpson



Following its annual two-month closure, The Royal Mews at Buckingham Palace is reopening (from 1 Feb). A centuries-old British term, the word mews refers to stables which have been converted into a row of houses, but of course these aren't just any stables: the British monarchy has been keeping its steeds here since 1534. As well as training the horses which pull the royal carriages, the mews is also responsible for the Queen's road transport, whether that be by carriage or car. A typical visit takes about an hour, during which time you'll see the carriage horses and coaches, including the Gold State Coach (above), commissioned by George III in 1762, and Queen Victoria's Irish State Coach, which she bought in 1852 for £858.

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

### **WAVES OF NOSTALGIA**

re you partial to a spot of nautical glamour? Then don't miss the Victoria and Albert Museum's new exhibition, Ocean Liners: Speed & Style (from 3 Feb; p. 50). It raises a crystal glass to the luxury and sheer drama of the cruise liner's golden age.

The exhibition reveals how these vast liners became a symbol of national ingenuity, as countries competed to out-engineer each other.

Fashionistas can drift away on a wave of nostalgia with Marlene Dietrich's Christian Dior suit, worn in 1950 by the movie star as she disembarked the MS Queen Elizabeth in New York. And don't miss the 1925

silk flapper dress worn by New York socialite Emilie Grigsby. There's tragedy, too: a 1909 Cartier tiara encrusted with diamonds and pearls was worn by Lady Allan, the wife of a steamship company chairman, during the final voyage of the Lusitania in 1915. The ship was sent to the bottom of the sea by a German torpedo - Lady Allan survived but her daughters died. You can also see the largest remaining fragment of the doomed Titanic - a Louis XVstyle Rococo panel found in the

Atlantic; it was torn from the first-class lounge as the ship

split in half in 1912. It seems that the glamour of the age still captures our imagination. - Neil Simpson





Hot on their heels is María Pagés Compañia in Yo Carmen (15-17 Feb), who will perform with 14 flamenco artists in a dance inspired by the woman behind Prosper Mérimée's novel,

which influenced Bizet's tragic opera Carmen.

Painter and Flamenco: JRT (18 Feb) is inspired by the Spanish symbolist painter Julio Romero de Torres, who is known for portraying Spanish women in his paintings. With dramatist Pedro G Romero, dancers Úrsula López, Tamara López and Leonor Leal aim to break down these stereotypes.

Dju-Dju (20 Feb) is a collaboration between the avant-garde choreographer and dancer Israel Galvan and the dancer Isabel Bayón Compañia, who explore the demons and superstitions of the flamenco world.

Finally, in Born a Shadow (25 Feb), Compañia Rafaela Carrasco, led by Carrasco

himself, celebrates four women from the Spanish Golden Age of the 1500s and 1600s.







here's hardly been a healthier time for English rugby union, so this is the perfect month to welcome the NatWest Six Nations Championship (from 3 Feb).

This is the northern hemisphere's biggest rugby tournament, and England has won the previous two. Is it going to be three wins in a row for Eddie Jones' men?

Unfolding over the course of five weekends, Twickenham Stadium hosts England's only home match this month, against Wales (10 Feb; p. 67) in the second round of matches. The tournament also features Ireland (who were runners-up last year), Wales, Scotland, France and Italy.

The Aussie Jones has led the England team to huge success since he took over as manager after their dismal 2015 World Cup. It has been 22 wins from 23 since he took charge: his team won the 2016

and 2017 Six Nations, plus all of their three matches in last November's Autumn Internationals - including the prize scalp of beating their old foes Australia.

Whichever team you follow, there's even more good news for rugby fans: the new World Rugby Museum opens its doors at Twickenham Stadium (p. 67), after a major refurbishment and rebuilding.

Boasting more than a century of sporting history, this is the venue in which to take a guided tour with a rugby expert. Inside, its interactive galleries tell the story of rugby from the schoolboy game to the international sport it is today.

Head behind the scenes to see photos of the match in 1910 between England and Wales - the first international test match played here. England won that game 11-6. Is that a scoreline set to be repeated? - Emma Levine



ack in the 1920s, when alcohol was banned in the States during Prohibition, illicit bars known as speakeasies proliferated – often disguised as another venue.

New bar **Jack Solomons** 

Club has launched in Soho in the basement of 41 Great Windmill Street – ring the bell by the entrance, which is through a hidden door accessed via a late-night delicatessen.

As you walk down the stairs you'll pass a butchery chamber, but once inside the décor is all about old-school glamour – think red leather walls and velvet furnishings. There's a dance floor, too, with live bands and DJs (41 Great Windmill St, W1D 7LU).

Bars might be disguised as a 1920s chemists – like the new **Evans & Peel Pharmacy** in Chiswick, which is full of antique surgical equipment (42 Devonshire Rd, W4 2HD).

Look out for a detective's office (Evans & Peel Detective

Agency), a suit shop (Discount Suit Company) and a public toilet (CellarDoor). You may need a password to gain entry to some bars ('Hair of the Dog' at Purl), while there's not even a sign for 69 Colebrooke Row.

A parallel universe lies on the far side of a gilt-framed mirror in the **Looking Glass Cocktail Club** (49 Hackney Rd, E2 7NX). Step inside the glass into a dimly lit secret room. DJs and bands entertain you as you sample the menu, which is themed around musical eras. **Callooh Callay** has a

wardrobe – JubJub Bar is on the other side. To gain entry, you'll need a key (65 Rivington St, EC2A 3AY). Meanwhile, The King of Ladies Man in Battersea is hidden behind a sliding wall in a launderette (5-9 Battersea Rise, SW11 1HG), while The Breakfast Club has a 1950s fridge – which isn't just for milk... (12-16 Artillery Lane, E1 7LS).



# **BEYOND LONDON**



Why not escape the capital with a visit to of Britain's best-loved towns and cities? Why not escape the capital with a visit to some



ith a cathedral to rival Canterbury's, old walls that beat Chester's and a castle that competes with Colchester's, the city of York should be an obvious choice for visitors wanting to explore beyond London, but its location in the north east of England means it tends to get forgotten about.

This month, however, the annual city-wide Jorvik Viking Festival (12-18 Feb) - Europe's largest Viking festival - attracts more than 40,000 visitors. The event, which is now in its 34th year, marks the Viking invasion and conquest of the UK in 866AD. It also commemorates the Jolablot celebrations the Vikings held each

February to herald the coming of spring and the survival of winter. As well as candlelit. talks, mock battles and guided walks, festival highlights include stories read by warriors in a Viking encampment, a competition to find the strongest Viking, and a parade from Dean's Park between the

rival armies of the Vikings and Anglo-Saxons. Even if you miss the festival, you can still learn about the city's past at the Jorvik Viking Centre, which is built on the site of Viking buildings discovered in archaeological digs in the 1970s and 1980s. See a reconstruction of Viking Age streets, experience life in 10th-century York and

look at ancient artefacts such as decorative combs made from bone and rings crafted from antlers.

The centre is next to St Mary's Church, and on the other side of the church you'll find Fairfax House, a restored Georgian townhouse.

The house is overlooked by **Clifford's Tower**, which was built in the 12th century on the site of a grass mound and castle created by William the Conqueror 100 years earlier. Take a self-guided tour and you'll learn how the fort once housed the treasury and was used as a prison during the 1600s. From the top there are panoramic views of the city and you can walk along the old city walls - the longest town walls in England.


York Castle Museum, a Grade I-listed building that was once a jail, is next to the tower. Learn about its most notorious prisoner, highwayman Dick Turpin, and Elizabeth Boardingham, who

was the last woman to be burnt at the stake. On a lighter note, you can also see a traditional sweet shop and take part in tasting sessions. Why confectionery? Those with a sweet tooth can delve deeper into the city's relationship with cocoa at York's Chocolate Story. A guided tour teaches you about the origins of chocolate and how this led to the establishment of Terry's of York in 1767 - without which, we wouldn't have Terry's Chocolate Orange!

The 1920s home of the Terry family. **Goddards** House and Garden, is now a National Trust property on the outskirts of the city. Visitors can learn more about the family and the confectionery Noel Terry made in the Terry factory.

Children will also enjoy York Dungeon. Actors, special effects, storytelling and 360-degree sets bring the past alive while you have a check-up









by a plague doctor, get lost in a labyrinth and, if you're unlucky, experience execution by axe.

For a break from the sights, stroll around The Shambles, a cobbled street lined with shops, cafés and restaurants. It is York's oldest street, and it's so narrow, the roofs of its crooked 15th-century buildings almost touch.

Bettys tea rooms is nearby, on St Helen's Square; it's run by the third generation of the family that established it in 1919. It makes its own bread, cakes and chocolates in its bakery and serves afternoon tea, as does the Countess of York, which is a former train carriage. The sharing boards at Mannion & Co Kitchen opposite the Visit York Information Centre are also delicious

For something more substantial, try unusual dishes such as pig's head fritter with quince ketchup or curried mussels and pickled lime at Skosh by the train station; classic Italian plates in fairy-lit surroundings at Gusto, by Bettys, or La Vecchia Scuola, near York Chocolate Story, which is in a 300-year-old former girls' college.

There's plenty to see at the north end of the city, too. Yorkshire Museum in Museum Gardens. which opened in 1830, showcases the history of York from the prehistoric era through to the arrival of the Romans and beyond. Look out for a real dinosaur footprint, an 11,000-year-old engraved pendant and a Roman mosaic floor.

On the other side of the River Ouse, you'll find the National Railway Museum, As well as working steam locomotives, there is a Japanese 'bullet train' which travels at up to 130mph.

Last but not least, you can't visit York without seeing York Minster, which was built between 1220 and 1472. You can catch an event, attend a service, take a guided tour or climb 275 steps to the top of its 70m tower for amazing views of the city and countryside beyond.

#### Where to stay

For a treat, splash out on Grays Court Hotel, a smart, historical house with a newly renovated restaurant, The Bar Room. For a mid-range alternative, book The Parisi Hotel, a converted rectory near the Jorvik Viking Centre. A great budget option is Judges Lodging opposite Visit York Information Centre.



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


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









# **CONDON RIVER SERVICES MAP**


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
