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



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## HAPPY NEW YEAR

As the celebrations begin for the Year of the Pig, **Neil Simpson** finds out how Chinese Londoners mark the occasion

Chinese New Year 2019 falls on 5 February and, yes, it's the Year of the Pig. London is celebrating in a big way on 10 February with a raucous Chinatown parade and a cultural festival in Trafalgar Square. For an insight into the city's Chinese side, read our interviews with Londoners from various nations working in all industries.

#### AN-TING CHANG Artistic director of Chinese Arts Now Festival

Just like Christmas, eating is key to Chinese New Year, but the Chinese Arts Now festival (to 2 Feb) proves that there's more to the celebrations. The festival's CEO and artistic director An-Ting Chang tells us her London story.

Tgrew up in Taiwan and moved to London 10 years ago, to study piano performance at the Royal Academy of Music, 'An-Ting explains. 'Chinatown is very typical, with its lion dance and restaurants. Then there's the Trafalgar Square event, but we want to show the contemporary side to London's Chinese New Year, too – we want to tell modern stories rooted in our heritage.'

The Chinese Arts Now (CAN) festival programme includes a showcase of film and documentaries at the Southbank

Centre, Alissa Anne Jeun Yi's one-woman show *Love Songs* at Camden People's Theatre, as well as a play performed in a restaurant: *'Citizens of Nowhere?* is at Duddell's restaurant in London Bridge and the audience eat while they're watching,' explains An-Ting. The story follows British-Chinese matriarch Linda Lo as she visits London to share a big decision with her children (to 2 Feb).

Back in the West End, a new sculpture commissioned by CAN is going to be unveiled in early February outside Leicester Square's Hippodrome Casino. By Hong Kong's Otto Li, the 11m-long metal artwork is called Five Peaks and depicts China's Five Great Mountains (Wu Yue) in a contemporary way. 'It's inspired by the soundwaves created by the five peaks – it's very cool,' says An-Ting. How about the best way to get a taste of Taiwan in London? 'I guess our most noticeable influence is bubble tea, but they alter it for English tastes a lot! CoCo on Dean Street looks very authentic.' www.chineseartsnow.org.uk

#### **ELLEN CHEW**

#### CEO of the Rasa Sayang Group

Ellen Chew encapsulates the breadth of London's Chinese food scene.

She's CEO for the Rasa Sayang Group, which is named after Chinatown's Singaporean-Malaysian restaurant on Macclesfield Street. We meet Ellen there for a sweet cup of Malaysian milk tea, teh tarik.

Arriving in London in 2005, Ellen now oversees a restaurant empire!

'My other half studied in the UK and her industry [construction]



was booming. She had the opportunity to work here and I wanted to see London. I did marketing and leasing for food courts in Singapore, so I initially came here to help open a food court,' she explains. Eventually, Ellen opened Rasa Sayang in 2008. 'I wished to bring something from Singapore - the food I love,' she says.

So, what is the food like at Rasa Sayang? 'Before Singapore got its independence, the food was similar to Malaysia's, so we serve laksa [spicy noodle soup], char kuay teow [stir-fried flat noodles] and chicken rice. We share heritage, but there are changes in the taste to each dish that Singaporeans can detect. We also introduced yu sheng, a special for Chinese New Year. This raw salmon salad is very Singaporean – you don't find it in China or Hong Kong. We use a white fish back home, but it's always raw.' Yu sheng is made by theatrically tossing ingredients into the air, which Ellen says is a great way to get people talking: 'As we toss, we say good words for the new year and give blessings to each other – the higher the throw, the better your year will be!' Yu sheng will be on the menu for two weeks either side of Chinese New Year. www.rasasayangfood.com

#### PAUL LAU & EUGENE LING St Martin-in-the-Fields Church

Reverend Paul Lau

Near Trafalgar Square, St Martin-in-the-Fields church is in the heart of cosmopolitan London and its services reflect this: it holds Chinese-language Christian services. We visit its crypt-turned-café to meet Reverend Paul Lau and a member of the parochial church council, Eugene Ling.

'I was born in Hong Kong and worked there for 13 years, then after seven years in New Zealand I came to St Martin-in-the-Fields in 2000,' says Paul. 'There's been a Chinese congregation here for over 50 years. In Hong Kong, we'd have four days off for Chinese New Year, but in London we work.'

Eugene was also born in Hong Kong and came to London 20 years ago as a student. 'On Sundays we've normally got a 10am service, so you know when the parade is passing as there's so much drumming and it drifts into the church,' he says.

'They let off 10,000 fire crackers in Trafalgar Square,' Paul adds. 'You can't legally fire them anywhere else, but noise is vital in the celebrations. www.stmartin-in-the-fields.org





the chain of Ping Pong restaurants. Born and raised in Hong Kong, Ruby arrived in the UK as a teenager to study at Warminster School in Wiltshire, but yearned for the big city. 'It was idyllic countryside, but I moved

to London in my twenties,' she says.

'I'm not a classically trained chef but I always have eyes for new products and I like to mix new ingredients,' she adds. 'Our Chinese food has a twist to it, but there are certain traditional dishes that you must have, such as har gow [prawn dumplings] and shumai [open dumplings with goji berries]. Jian dui [fried rice-flour balls are typical for Chinese New Year, so we have a nice chocolate version on the menu this New Year. This is a very family-orientated time of year, but if I'm in London I'll have a party with my friends.'

Elsewhere, Ruby recommends the Victoria and Albert Museum. 'It has a lot of ancient Chinese art, which is an interesting way to learn about our history - you can easily spend a day there. she says. www.pingpongdimsum.com

Chinatown is packed with restaurants representing a range of East Asian cuisines, but where does all that food come from? Established in 1975, SeeWoo supermarket is a big cog in the Chinatown machine. We talk to its managing director, Lucy Mitchell.

'My father Tony came from Hong Kong in the early 1960s,' explains Lucy. 'Then he met my mum while they were working in a restaurant in Stanmore, northwest London. It was hard to get authentic Chinese ingredients, so he opened a supermarket in Chinatown. Eventually they were supplying restaurants around the country.'

SeeWoo's operation is a great insight into Chinatown life. 'We send a lorry to Chinatown at 8am, but if a restaurant has a busy lunch we can barrow-boy rice sacks to them at 3pm,' Lucy says.

With an English mother from London and a Chinese father, Lucy personifies the city's cultural melting pot. www.seewoo.com



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You're in one of the world's most romantic cities, so here's how to feel the love on Valentine's Day and during the rest of your visit, savs Sarah Riches

Tango is one of the sexiest dancing styles. During Tango Fire at the Peacock Theatre (to 18 Feb), you can watch groups such as the Tango Fuego Quartet perform Piazzolla, Pugliese and Gardel live on stage, setting the pace for seven dance couples including former world tango champions German Cornejo and Gisela Galeassi from Argentina, who perform a new solo for this production.

#### THE WOLSELEY

The Wolseley has garnered a reputation for its breakfasts. Built as a car showroom in 1921, it later became a bank before opening as a restaurant in 2003. Original features such as tall ceilings, columns and arches, along with monochrome geometric marble tiles and embossed napkins, make it feel like a grand European café. Come for breakfast and enjoy almond

or butter croissants, pain au chocolates, or bites of rum and vanilla sponge which are made on-site. Other treats include caramelised pink grapefruit, stacked berry pancakes, haddock kedgeree and haggis and duck eggs drizzled with whisky sauce.

A special day calls for special coffee – so treat yourself and your other half to an espresso poured over vanilla ice cream; a hazelnut and espresso hot chocolate, or The Wolseley Imperial. The latter is made with Mandarine Napoleon liqueur, Cognac, espresso and hot milk topped with chocolate.

Planning to propose? Then book the private room, which has arched windows overlooking the main dining room.

Spencer House, an 18th-century Grade I-listed mansion, is owned by Earl Spencer, the brother of the late Princess Diana. Guided tours take in the opulent Painted Room, which is as grand as anything you'll find in Buckingham Palace. Completed in 1765 around the theme of the Triumph of Love, it has dancing nymphs on the walls and a wedding frieze on the chimney alongside columns, chandeliers and elaborate plasterwork. You can see why Jerry Hall and Rupert Murdoch chose this architectural masterpiece for their wedding ceremony in 2016.

The Albert Memorial, opposite the Royal Albert Hall, is a grand monument that was funded by Prince Albert's widow, Queen Victoria, in 1861. The Italian Gardens, on the other side of the park in Kensington Gardens, were created in the same era as a present from the prince to the Queen and are just as romantic, with marble fountains and stone swan statues.

They say that oysters are an aphrodisiac. If you want to get in the mood for love, visit J Sheekey for oysters and Champagne, Established in 1896, the Covent Garden restaurant has a classic interior, with wood-panelled walls lined with prints of actors. Its winter terrace, meanwhile, has all the right ingredients for a special meal red walls, a log fire and blankets. Warm up over fish stew or cosy up over caviar, crab and ceviche.







Love is in the air on board the Coca-Cola London Eye's Cupid's Capsule. It's not cheap, but it is special because you can sip a bottle of Champagne and feed each other Hotel Chocolat pink Champagne truffles. You'll have the capsule to yourself for a 30-minute rotation, accompanied by a personal host.

The Petersham in Covent Garden is one of London's most romantic restaurants. Like the original venue in Richmond, it brims with flowers and plants, with jars of wildflowers on mirrored tables. Columns and chandeliers create a romantic vibe. If you opt for a two- or three-course pre-theatre menu (5pm-6.30pm), you'll have a choice of three starters, mains and desserts. Dine on seasonal, mostly organic produce with Italian flair such as burrata with black figs, roast chicken with pied de mouton, braised shallots and tarragon; plaice with saffron mussels and pear and almond tart.

Anton & Erin - Dance Those Magical Musicals at the Barbican (9-14 Feb) has all the ingredients of old-fashioned romance: twinkling lights, sequinned dresses, tuxedos and rousing tunes. The London Concert Orchestra plays classics from musicals such as 42nd Street, Top Hat and Mary Poppins as the stars of TV's Strictly Come Dancing show off ballroom moves.



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#### **QUEEN OF HOXTON**

Queen of Hoxton has taken inspiration from the 2001 film *Moulin Rouge!*, as its rooftop has been transformed into Lady Celeste's Parisian rooftop bar. Decorated like bohemian Montmartre in the 1900s, it has vintage posters, a heart-shaped arch lit by fairylights and an illuminated windmill.

Toast marshmallows by the fire and stay warm with hot buttered rum, spiked hot chocolate or a Black Forest gateau drink made with dark cacao liqueur and cranberries. You can also sip mulled port, or from a fountain of absinthe.

If it's chilly outside, sit indoors at cabaret tables and watch entertainers. Tarot readers predict your future in the Lover's Fortune tent (14 Feb).

Fancy a late-night snack? Then share raclette, cornichons and charcuterie; a Moulin Ooze – a toastie made with Gruyère cheese, onions and Dijon mustard – or the Henri Toulouse, a charred burger made from Toulouse sausage and Gruyère cheese. A cheesy end to a romantic day.

#### ANTI-VALENTINE

Single, heartbroken or think Valentine's Day is commercialised nonsense? Then watch *Company*, a musical about a single woman on her 35th birthday. Bobbie's friends are coupled up or married and think she should be, but she has other ideas. If you do too, catch this comical production at the Gielgud Theatre (to 30 Mar).

Alternatively, if you're single but keen to mingle, dance the night away at Eat Your Heart Out! in The Vaults beneath Waterloo Station (16 Feb). Dress code: 80s! Head of Lates, Laura Drake Chambers, says: 'Eat Your Heart Out!' is cynically commenting on Valentine Day's antiquated celebrations and will feature a Meet Market for singles as well as a Sham Wedding Chapel with immersive characters and games, as well as all-girl punk band Dream Nails and DJs.'





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Feeling the chill? Then hunker down in cosy bookshops, plush cinemas and heated rooftop terraces. Here are a few of London's snuggliest spots

#### **Dalloway Terrace**

A hit with Instagrammers, this heated outdoor terrace in Bloomsbury has been treated to a frosty festive makeover for the winter months. Indulge in truffle cheese fondue and warming cocktails, while staying snug with hot water bottles and woollen blankets. www.dallowauterrace.com

#### Electric Cinema

Snuggle up under cashmere blankets on a velvet bed or leather armchair at this plush Edwardian cinema. The perfect spot for a romantic date, this cinema on Portobello Road in Notting Hill boasts gorgeous decor and a bar stocked with Champagne and other tipples. The Electric's sister screen in Shoreditch is equally luxurious. www.electriccinema.co.uk

#### Teatulia

Sip a cup of tea while reading a book in the Covent Garden setting of Teatulia, a literary tea shop and cocktail bar rolled into one. By day, the 16-cover venue serves six types of tea and in the evening, the bar offers tea-based cocktails. The Art Decostyle venue has a wall-to-wall 'Living Bookshelf', curated by influential authors and artists. www.teatulia.com

#### Gordon's Wine Bar

Enjoy a glass or two of quality wine at a rickety candlelit table inside this cave-like bar near Embankment, Established in 1890, this intimate subterranean watering hole is thought to be the oldest wine bar in London, Maintaining its original interior, the bar's aged wooden walls are decorated with old newspaper cuttings and memorabilia. Arrive before 4pm if you want to bag a table. www.gordonswinebar.com

#### Libreria

Curl up with a book in one of the lamp-lit alcoves in this hidden gem of a bookshop near Brick Lane. Books are grouped according to theme, such as 'the city', 'wanderlust' or 'love', helping you to find titles you might not otherwise come across. A haven from modern life, the shop has a no-phone policy. www.libreria.io

#### The Holly Bush

Find a cosy bolthole at The Holly Bush, which fits perfectly into the quaint Hampstead village it calls home: it has an open fire, stripped wooden floors, excellent ales and amazing Sunday roast lunches. Or simply reward yourself with a refreshing pint after a bracing walk on nearby Hampstead Heath. www.hollybushhampstead.co.uk


#### Ye Olde Cheshire Cheese

Step back in time at this Fleet Street drinking institution. Dating back to the 16th century, the boozer has welcomed Charles Dickens, Dr Samuel Johnson, Alfred Tennyson and Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, who have all raised a glass under its roof. The pub's dark wood-panelled walls, higgledy-piggledy rooms and open fire make it something of a time warp. T: 020-7353 6170



ere at London Planner, we are, naturally, the first to say that this city is at the centre of the world. But it's much more than that: London is at the centre of time itself.

Mean Time (GMT) was established in 1884 at the Royal Observatory (p. 32) in Greenwich, with a simple line that divides the entire earth between east and west. So, if you weren't sure what GMT stood for or why it was named 'Greenwich', now you know. You can stand on both sides of the world simultaneously, then have your confusing clock-related questions answered, such as why Britain turns back the clock during winter.

Greenwich is also where you'll find the **Cutty Sark** (p. 24), which is a reminder of how London became a star on the world stage. It was the fastest tea clipper when it was launched in 1869, and the driving force behind the country's quest to bring Asia to the west. Step on board – and right beneath the hull – to hear its amazing story.

The eyes of the world fell on **Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park** (p. 30) in 2012, when London became the only city to host the modern summer Olympics three times. If there was one place in the world where all people felt welcome, it was here. Today, the London Legacy Corporation

works to ensure that this spirit lives on. For example, the park includes art from around the world, such as New Yorker Miya Andos's Since 9/11 sculpture near the Aquatics Centre, made from steel recovered at Ground Zero.

One of the most striking sights in London? That has to be **Chinatown**, which is somewhat hidden among the high-octane highways of Shaftesbury Avenue and Leicester Square, but has its own particular energy. It's a sprawling spread of East Asian culture, from Vietnamese noodles and Taiwanese bubble teas to a tuneful collection of karaoke joints. As London enters the Year of the Pig, you can find out more about this glorious and bustling area on a China Exchange walking tour (2, 5 & 19 Feb; www.chinatown.co.uk).



It's time for a vocabulary lesson: the word 'mews' is a centuries-old British term, which refers to stables converted into a row of houses. This family-friendly attraction gives visitors a chance to see the opulent royal carriages, including the magnificent Gold State Coach.

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

# Capture the world

he British Museum is famed for its objects from every corner of the earth, while a diverse line-up of artists and subjects hang on The National Gallery's walls. Likewise, if you dig deeper into London's museum and gallery scene, you'll find that its global influence spreads far.

Case in point: an exhibition that is planning to tour the world is making its debut in Waterloo's historic graffiti tunnels. *Mandela: The Official Exhibition* (from 8 Feb) tells Nelson Mandela's life story in collaboration with the Royal House of Mandela, which works to underline the late statesman's royal bloodline in his native South Africa (www.mandelaexhibition.com).

**Black Cultural Archives**, on Brixton's Windrush Square, is dedicated to preserving and celebrating the culture of the UK's African and Caribbean communities. It's the only centre

of its kind in the country; it was established in 1981 and has a library, café, shop, exhibitions and poetry events (www.blackculturalarchives.org).

From 1980s Brixton to present-day King's Cross, The **House of Illustration** is shining a light on others who wish to call London home, with *Journeys Drawn: Illustration from the Refugee Crisis* (to 24 Mar). The work of 12 artists depicts epic journeys that are currently being undertaken by migrants – some of the pictures are by refugees (www.houseofillustration.org.uk).

Cuba's Tania Bruguera is presenting her take on the global migration crisis, in **Tate Modern**'s Turbine Hall. The name of her Hyundai Commission, 10,145,987 (to 24 Feb; p. 48), may have changed by the time this magazine is printed: that number rises every time a migrant dies during a journey. It's a stirring installation which reminds us that, as a global city, London's duty is to speak for everyone.



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
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new play inspired by the legendary singer Nina Simone is the latest example of London's racially diverse theatre scene. Black is the Color of My Voice at Trafalgar Studios (from 5 Feb; p. 52) is written and performed by Apphia Campbell, who plays Mena Bordeaux, Depressed after her father's untimely death, Bordeaux visits a doctor who recommends a three-day detox from cigarettes, alcohol and her phone. During this time, she reflects on her family, former lovers, the racist incidents she has experienced and her past, which began as a young piano prodigy destined for a life in church before she became a renowned jazz vocalist, classical pianist and civil rights activist.

A simple, low-budget set means that all eyes - and ears - are on Campbell throughout the 70-minute monologue. Her rendition of Simone's Feeling Good will give you goosebumps. On some evenings, the play is followed by Campbell's cabaret, Soul Sessions.

This month also sees black British actress Sharon D Clarke star in the Olivier Award-winning musical Caroline, or Change at the Playhouse **Theatre** (p. 51). Tony Kushner (Angels in America) wrote the script, which is based on a book inspired by his childhood. Set in 1963 Louisiana, it focuses on Caroline (Clarke), a maid doing laundry in her employer's basement. Eight-year-old Noah often visits her, but when he sneaks her some extra cash



it sets off a chain of events - just as the civil rights movement gathers pace. Both performances are indicative of the city's diverse theatre scene and West End blockbusters are no exception. The Lion King, Motown the Musical (p. 52), Tina: The Tina Turner Musical (p. 52) and **Hamilton** all feature a mixed cast, while in 2018, The Old Vic's hip-hop musical Sylvia saw lead roles played by black actors: Genesis Lynea was suffragette Sylvia Pankhurst and

Delroy Atkinson played Winston Churchill. When it comes to talent, the London stage is becoming colour blind.

Ale, lager or stout? As Norwich plays host to a beer festival, Sarah Riches gets a taste of the city's historic pubs

rits love to drink. When it hits 6pm on a Friday night and the week's work is done, there is one question asked throughout the land: 'Shall we go for a pint?' Everyone has a local - a pub close to their home or workplace. While the landlord might not know your name, it's a welcoming place where you can enjoy a beer that's been served with a little bit of love.

The beer industry has undergone a revolution in recent years and there are now pints to suit every palate, from raspberry and chocolate beer, to pint and pie pairings.

This month, as a beer festival takes place in Norwich in Norfolk, East Anglia, we raise a glass to one of the country's finest drinking spots, which is home to many historic pubs and breweries.

#### FESTIVAL SPIRITS

If you're a beer fan, then Norwich is the place to be, as the Campaign for Real Ale (CAMRA) is hosting the Great British Beer Festival in St Andrew's and Blackfriars Hall (19-23 Feb), a medieval friary near Norwich Cathedral.

Now in its third and final year at the venue, the festival gives you the chance to try winter beers such as stout and porter; vegan, vegetarian and gluten-free varieties, and ales, ciders and perries.

Each year, CAMRA also awards drinks the prize of Champion Winter Beer of Britain. You can sample the winners at a bar in Blackfriars Hall and pair them with hot street food.

St Andrew's Hall hosts brewery bars and a cider bar serving 60 ciders and perries (made from fermented pears) graded on their



sweetness. More than a third of these are from East Anglia, so you're bound to come across varieties you've not tried before.

Feeling adventurous? You can also sample global beers in the marquee off St Andrew's Hall, which has a World Beer Bar serving pints such as Hof Ten Dormaal raspberry and chocolate beer, as well as keg and bottled beer.

Live pop, rock and indie bands will perform in St Andrew's Hall, so you can make a day of it. The five-piece band Dove and Boweevil kicks things off with blues and Americana, followed by rock 'n' roll from Polymer. The Collective plays funk, soul and disco while Pirate Joe and The Foreign Locals keep things mellow with reggae and Balkan gypsy-folk - before pumping the crowd with some beatbox tunes. The Pewterscribe, meanwhile, will engrave your tankards, flasks, lighters or keyrings as a memento of your trip to the beer festival (www.norwichcamra.org.uk).

#### SOMETHING IS BREWING

Over the past few years, the number of breweries in the country has grown to more than 2,000. Norwich is home to Chalk Hill Brewery, which is behind Norwich Station. You can tour the city's longest-running independent brewery for free. It brews seven real ales, including Flintknappers, a dark red ale with a roasted barley flavour - perfect for a chilly winter's day (www.chalk-hillbrewery.co.uk).

Redwell, south of the city centre, also hosts monthly brewery tours, as well as tasting sessions and occasional events such as magic shows and silent discos. Founded in 2013, it also brews vegan and gluten-free beers (www.redwellbrewing.com).


The Fat Cat Brewing Company, which brews ales labelled with a distinctive cat logo, is at the other end of the city. Try its marmalade ale, black elder stout - which has notes of blackcurrants and elderberries - or milk stout, which tastes like milk chocolate (www.fatcatbrewery.co.uk).

# Last Pub Standing

#### A ROUND AND ANOTHER ROUND

A pub crawl can be a barrel of laughs. Here's what you do: a group of people will start at a pub, have a drink, walk to the next one and repeat. This lets you visit as many pubs as possible in one night.

The Fringe Festival (1-28 Feb) has created an updated pub crawl. The treasure trail competition, which is an organised pub crawl, can be tackled alone or with friends. If you answer all the pubs' questions correctly, you could win £100 worth of beer (www.winter.gbbf.org.uk/the-fringe).

Norwich is home to many historic pubs. History buffs should start at Norwich Castle in the city centre - completed in 1121, it was intended to be a palace. Over time it was a jail and a museum, and it's now a gallery. It's surrounded by historic pubs, including Last Pub Standing, which serves Wild Weather's Bello Di Mamma, a stout that tastes like tiramisu (www.lastpubstanding.co.uk).

The Murderers, which dates back to the 17th century, is nearby, as is The Sir Garnet next to Norfolk Market, which dates from 1861 (www.themurderers.co.uk; www.thesirgarnet.co.uk).

Make sure you visit Strangers' Hall, a 14th-century house which got its name after refugees lodged here in the 1500s. It opened as a folk museum in 1900 and now you can learn about how Georgians dined and visit Victorian-period rooms. Nearby, The Belgian Monk serves 45 Belgian beers and offer drinks not sold anywhere else in the UK, such as Ter Dolen Kriek (cherry) beer - which is worth raising a glass for (www.thebelgianmonk.com).

#### WHERE TO STAY: The

Georgian Townhouse has 22 bedrooms with mid-century features such as rotary phones and vintage mirrors. From £109 per night. The Assembly House has 11 spacious rooms with four-poster beds, a grand dining hall and a cookery school. From £170 per night.

WHERE TO EAT: Alchemista Coffee Co in the city centre is best for breakfast. It serves

coffee in skull-shaped glasses. Look out for a machine made up of wires and antique clocks and a gramophone. For lunch, sink into a leather armchair at Biddy's Tea Room, which serves 50 types of tea alongside Scotch eggs, pork pies and cheeseboards.



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




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### London bus map

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
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








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
