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

Did you know that Vincent van Gogh once lived in London? Neil Simpson visits Tate Britain's exhibition to find out how the city influenced his art


he last time that the Tate opened a Vincent van Gogh show, it caused a sensation: the year was 1947 and record numbers of people left post-war Britain behind to enter the Dutchman's world. Walking around Tate Britain's current exhibition, Van Gogh and Britain (to 11 Aug), it's easy to see why we keep falling for his kaleidoscopic view of the world. The art gallery has teamed up with Ernst

The art gallery has teamed up with Ernst & Young for this blockbuster show, which celebrates the cultural interchange that began when van Gogh arrived in Britain in 1837 – and continues 182 years later. The show includes art by influencers and followers of van Gogh, as well as more than 45 works by the legend himself.



INSIDE THE EXHIBITION

Tate Britain's spacious galleries are a suitably grand setting, allowing this big collection enough room to breathe. Moreover, *Van Gogh and Britain* is organised in a methodical, manageable way that won't overwhelm you.

It begins with his arrival in London aged 20, to work for the Covent Garden art dealer Goupil & Cie, before sending visitors on a chronological journey through the artist's masterpieces, death and posthumous glory, which has been made possible through the art of those he has since inspired.

THE LONDON LIFE

Van Gogh's letters home piece together his three years in England. Trials in his personal life caused the artist to grow increasingly melancholic and Tate presents us with Meindert Hobbema's oil painting, *The Avenue at Middelharnis*. Van Gogh saw this landscape in London's National Gallery; its depiction of a lone figure on a tree-lined avenue became a theme in his work.

One of Britain's most celebrated painters also had an impact on van Gogh's developing style: John Constable was loved for his ability to capture the landscape of his home county, Suffolk. Van >

Gogh's own landscapes, such as *Starry Night* over the Rhône, tell of Constable's influence.

Print-making was a booming business while van Gogh was in London and, through his work at Goupil & Cie, he became a collector. He bought a print of prisoners exercising in Newgate Prison and, during the final year of his life, he returned to this image to create his only scene of London. The liveliness of the brush strokes and colours clash with the sad setting – it's an insight into van Gogh's complicated, mournful mind.

AFTERLIFE

Before his art caught the attention of the world, van Gogh shot himself. The exhibition pushes us from his death in 1890 to 1910, when van Gogh's work was shown to British art lovers for the first time. It is said that the term 'Post-Impressionist' was created for this show and that visitors were shocked by his unfamiliar painting style.

Next, it explores his impact on British artists, with a display of paintings by Matthew Smith, Spencer Gore and Harold Gilman – also known as the Camden Town Group. Van Gogh's 1889 oil painting of pine trees and cedar bushes in Saint-Rémy – a dramatic work of bloody reds and swirling greens – is in the same room, so you can see the similarities for yourself.

The most famous paintings are in the final rooms, which helps you to understand why van Gogh became a giant following his death. His sunflowers stand in a bright room that is filled with flowery work by painters who studied him.

It is easy to think of van Gogh as a tragic talent, who died without knowing the recognition that he would achieve. What this show does is remember his human side, by presenting a fuller artistic story – told from a uniquely British perspective. www.tate.org.uk

SIGHTSEEING

There are plenty of open-top bus tours to try, but one of them is literally greener than most: The Original Tour launched a frogcoloured vehicle last year that was hailed as London's first fully electric sightseeing bus. The carbon-free bus is fully charged in four and a half hours, after which it can travel 150km – catch **Original's Electric Bus Tour** daily at 10am from Victoria. The company is launching three more and you can expect other firms to follow suit, thanks to the introduction of London's Ultra Low Emission Zone (ULEZ) in April by the Mayor (*www.theoriginaltour.com*).

Of course, there's nothing greener than sightseeing on foot. **Insider London** runs a Cutting Edge Green Tour, a two-hour jaunt which shows you the city's sustainable side, including shops and hotels that are leading the way. You'll find out about centuries-old London landmarks that are becoming greener and see the world's biggest solar-powered structure.

Insider London also runs the Sustainable Architecture Walking Tour, which takes you through the ancient City to

discover the area's skyscrapers. It starts at Bishopsgate and takes two hours (*www. insiderlondon.co.uk*).

EATING OUT

This month, London's latest zero-waste restaurant opens in the east. **Silo** is in Hackney Wick, on the canal near Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park. Founded by Douglas McMaster, the restaurant is well worth a visit: the original Silo in Brighton claims to be the UK's first zero-waste restaurant and has become an acclaimed place to eat (*www.silobrighton.com*).

Just like Brighton, Hackney's Silo will have its own ecosystem, dealing directly with producers, buying wholefoods, composting food and growing its own produce. McMaster is also helping Crate Brewery and Pizzeria, next to Silo, to improve its own sustainability, making the area a wonderfully green destination (*www.cratebrewery.com*).

Cub in Hoxton also tries hard to eliminate waste. It's the first restaurant by the worldrenowned bartender Ryan Chetiyawardana and trust me, it's brilliant. The entire dining room is made from recycled materials and the menu relies heavily on food waste and overlooked ingredients. Fortunately, the food is creative, unpredictable and delicious. The set menu is great value, because it incorporates drinks to match most

it incorporates drinks to match most courses. Dinner here was the tastiest sustainability lesson I've ever had (www.lyancub.com). ▶

Vivienne Westwood design

Since watching the documentary *A Plastic Planet*, acclaimed chef Skye Gyngell has been on a mission to make **Spring** in Somerset House one of London's first plastic-free restaurants: it was one of the first to stop using plastic straws and Gyngell aims to eventually

eradicate all single-use plastic at Spring. Meanwhile, Spring's Scratch menu turns the kitchen's leftover food into delicious dishes, so nothing gets thrown away. The pre-theatre Scratch menu is available every day (5.30pm-6.30pm) and costs £20 for three courses (www.springrestaurant.co.uk).

Finally, check out **@FeastFairly** on Instagram. This scheme encourages London chefs to buy agricultural waste supplied by farmers and turn it into delicious creations for their menus. It'll give you lots more ideas on where to take your growling stomach.

A tip from me to you: never be embarrassed to ask for a doggy bag, anywhere. Otherwise, your leftovers will most likely go in the bin – you'll be glad you did when you're feeling hungry later!

SHOPPING

This city's fashion is celebrated for being cool and confident, so if you want to invest in something distinctly London, go vintage. Brick Lane, Camden and Portobello Road

are all tremendous places to source a one-off fashion fix. Vintage

stores to seek out include **Beyond Retro** (with three sites in London) and **Rokit** (four), which both offer affordable and fun clothes shopping (www.beyondretro.com; www.rokit.co.uk).

If you do pick Portobello Road, this is also the place for sustainable shopping beyond clothing: browse rows of shops and stalls filled with retro souvenirs and quirky antiques from the likes of **Portobello Stamp Company** and **Vida Vida**, which sells ethical, handmade leather bags and accessories. Don't forget that the market is closed on Sundays (*www.portobelloroad.co.uk*).

London's grand dame of fashion is **Vivienne Westwood**, who has become the clothing world's foremost eco-warrior. Her mantra is 'buy well, choose less, make it last'. If I was planning to rip up my holiday budgeting plan in one shop, I would spend it here (*www.viviennewestwood.com*).

Stand with a foot in each hemisphere at Royal Observatory Greenwich, where you'll find the Prime Meridian Line, the UK's largest refracting telescope, a 4.5-billion-year-old asteroid and the only planetarium in London. While you're in Greenwich, it's also worth climbing aboard the Cutty Sark, the world's sole surviving tea clipper; and swinging by the Queen's House, a 1616 royal villa. Grab some street food at Greenwich Market and enjoy knockout views of the Thames and the Docklands from Greenwich Park.

Getting there: Travel to Greenwich Pier by river boat from the Tower of London within 20 minutes.

Eltham Palace

Palace Fusing stunning 1930s Art Deco design with medieval fortifications, Eltham Palace

is one of the most unique historical properties in London. Once a favoured hunting spot of King Henry VIII, the royal palace fell into decline until the 1930s, when millionaires Stephen and Virginia Courtauld transformed it into a glamorous home for entertaining leading society figures.

Getting there: Trains from London Charing Cross to Mottingham take 24 minutes. It's then a 15-minute walk to the palace.

WWT London Wetland Centre

Warner Bros. Studio Tour London

Delve behind the scenes of the *Harry Potter* film series at this must-see attraction, where you can stroll down Diagon Alley and board the original Hogwarts Express locomotive. New for 2019 is Gringotts Wizarding Bank, the Studio's biggest expansion to date, where visitors can walk through a gallery of goblins and explore the Lestrange Vault. You can also discover the costumes and prosthetics used by the goblin bankers, including Bogrod and Griphook. **Getting there:** Trains to Watford Junction from London Euston take 20 minutes. Regular shuttle buses run from Watford Junction to the Studio Tour with a journey time of 15 minutes.

Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew

Escape the bustle of the city at London's largest UNESCO World Heritage Site. To mark its 260th birthday, Kew opened a 10,000sqm Children's Garden in May, featuring an aerial walkway, a giant sand pit, 'pollen' spheres, hammocks, trampolines and stepping stones. And for those with a passion for art, 32 showstopping installations by the world-renowned American glass artist Dale Chihuly are on display at Kew (to 27 Oct). **Getting there:** Take the District line to Kew Gardens from central London.

WWT London Wetland Centre

Amble around the lagoons, ponds and sweetscented gardens of this 105-acre wildlife haven. A hit with families and wildlife lovers, visitors can watch wild birds from numerous hides or from the comfort of the heated observatory. The eagle-eyed can expect to see kingfishers, falcons, herons and sparrowhawks, as well as otters, insects and ducks.

Getting there: Take the Tube to Hammersmith station then jump on the 33 or 72 bus.

BIGGER THAN THE PLATE

Take a big bite out of the V&A's new immersive exhibition, *FOOD: Bigger than the Plate*, to explore the pleasure and politics of what and how we eat today



he exhibition falls at a pivotal time where food and our relationship to it are topics of increasing global interest and debate. Featuring more than 70 contemporary projects, the exhibition explores food from compost to table. The V&A will be showing a range of projects – see edible water bottles, mushrooms growing from coffee grounds and foodie Instagram stars.

Taking a fresh, experimental and often provocative perspective, projects will present ideas and alternative food futures from gastronomic experiments to creative interventions in farming, with some actually physically growing in the museum. This multi-sensory exhibition unwraps the way we grow and farm, trade, eat and dispose of food. It brings together creativity and innovation from artists and designers working together with scientists, chefs, farmers and communities to change how we eat and reconnect with food.

The future of food is in our hands and nothing is off the table.

Leonardo da Vinci

Master mind

here's more to Leonardo da Vinci than fabulous art, you know. If you didn't know, then discover the full da Vinci story at **The British Library**, where a new exhibition about his most precious notebooks is opening.


Leonardo da Vinci: A Mind in Motion (from 7 Jun; p. 25) brings together three hallowed artefacts, brimming with the handwritten workings of this revered mind. These notebooks have never been grouped together in the UK and, as the exhibition's name suggests, they'll show da Vinci's major preoccupation with movement.

The movement of objects might seem an unusual obsession but, as far as da Vinci was concerned, motion is at the heart of, well, everything. The core objects in the exhibition are a trio of codices (a codex is an ancient manuscript, in the form of a book), which cover his musings on nature, geometry, mechanics, astronomy and the human body. The *Codex Arundel*, for example, includes a drawing that explores how sunlight dances across

rippling water. It features da Vinci's trademark intense and energetic sketching, but also scattered equations and notations – it's like seeing blueprints for the masterful art that followed.

The *Codex Arundel* is owned by The British Library while the *Codex Forster* has been lent by South Kensington's Victoria and Albert Museum, but the exhibition's third star, the *Codex Leicester*, was purchased by Bill Gates in 1994. This is the first time that the Microsoft founder has released the codex for display in the UK. Gates's book includes studies of different types of surfaces and the use of obstacles; da Vinci's dense writing floods these pages, alongside neat, elaborate doodles.

Institutions around the world are marking 500 years since da Vinci was born (including The Queen's Gallery at Buckingham Palace, with *Leonardo da Vinci: A Life in Drawing*; p.58) but with *A Mind in Motion*, The British Library underlines just how insatiably curious this man was. Da Vinci looked at the world around him and couldn't wait to untangle it all. Now you can gaze at the papers where all of his fantastic energy was transferred. – *Neil Simpson*

Bold and beautiful

appy 251st anniversary to the annual Summer Exhibition! The **Royal Academy** of **Arts**' trademark event has once again invited all kinds of creators to show their work in London. Open to any practitioner who wishes to submit a piece, this huge contemporary art showcase is predictably unpredictable.

The Piccadilly arts institution's mission is to populate the **Summer Exhibition** (from 10 Jun; p. 58) with approximately 1,200 artworks. It was expected that 15,000 artworks would be submitted this year, so that's a lot of decision-making. Every year, this mammoth task is appointed to the Summer Exhibition committee. The 2019 committee is headed up by the British painter Jock McFadyen. Along with a small group of fellow Royal Academicians, he has been narrowing down the works since February's submission deadline. Each committee member is then in charge of one gallery at the RA, which gives the exhibition an eclectic vibe.

McFadyen has previously been the Artist in Residence at The National Gallery, the set and costume designer for Sir Kenneth MacMillan's final ballet *The Judas Tree* and has staged more than 40 exhibitions of his work over the years. In other words, his experience should lead to a typically interesting show.



McFadyen is looking for art that 'responds to the contemporary world', so expect lots of political points to be made throughout. The art on display always covers as many disciplines as possible, from sketches to sculptures and mosaics to movies.

The final decisions on which works are going to be on display are taken during the penultimate eight days before the show opens.

There are two key things to remember about the *Summer Exhibition*: the first is that anyone can enter work for consideration and the second is that it is massive. Thanks to the pairing of these two elements, it is guaranteed to be a thrilling show. – *Neil Simpson*

An artful show

irque du Soleil's *Toruk - The First Flight* at The O2 (26-30 Jun) is a hat trick of creativity, with elaborate make-up, costumes and sets. The show is a prequel to James Cameron's 2009 science-fiction film *Avatar*, which is set during a time when Earth's natural resources have been depleted and humans are colonising the jungle planet of Pandora to mine its resources. With input from the film's director, you'll be wowed by the circus show even if you've never seen the film.

Despite *Toruk* being set in the 22nd century, its plot is still relevant. A natural catastrophe threatens to destroy a tree that's sacred to Pandora's native Na'vi tribe. So when two teenagers discover the flame-coloured flying predator Toruk can help save it, they set out on a quest to the Floating Mountains to find it.

As always, the acts are impressive, with acrobats racing up trees thanks to a pulley system and vertical mattresses, and performers flying enormous kites and climbing up silks.

But what the performers are wearing really brings the show to life. Costume and make-up designer Kym Barrett says: 'Most of our costumes look like they were made by Na'vi hands; they have an organic, handmade look. We use a lot of materials that look like they grew on a tree or came from the forest.'

The tournament takes place every four years and sees the world's greatest teams take part, fighting to win cricket's most prestigious prize. All 10 teams play each other in a 50-over match in a round-robin format, with the top four nations qualifying for the semi-finals.

This month in London, Kia Oval hosts four of these thrilling encounters, seeing the crème de la crème of international teams including England, South Africa, India and Australia (2, 5, 9 & 15 Jun). Lord's, considered to be the world's home of cricket, also hosts five matches (plus the final). It includes what's likely to be a humdinger of a match, between England and the current world champions (and five-time winners) Australia (25 Jun). In contrast Afghanistan are taking part in their second World Cup – they're a nation whose players mainly learned to play in refugee camps in Pakistan. 'Now, it's not like it was before. In 2015, people said it's a proud moment that Afghanistan are a part of the World Cup,' their batsman Hashmatullah Shahidi told the ICC. 'Now, it's time to say this to everyone else: "Wake up, Afghanistan is coming!"

So who will lift the trophy on 14 July? Many cricket luminaries say England. 'The strong favourites in the World Cup tournament are England,' said former Indian international Sunil Gavaskar recently. 'And it is not just because it will be a home World Cup for them, but because they have changed their attitude towards ODI [one-day international] cricket.'

England have never won the World Cup, having made the semi-finals three times, so perhaps it's their turn. And don't rule out India, as it could even be these two teams in the final. – Emma Levine

Plate of the art

ave you been inspired by a blockbuster exhibition? Then dine in a restaurant surrounded by art, from sculptures and murals to paintings and illustrations. **Rex Whistler Restaurant**, a British restaurant inside Tate Britain gallery (p. 58), opened in 1927 and is known for its wine and mural. All four walls feature Rex Whistler's *The Expedition in Pursuit of Rare Meats*, which depicts a scene of a deer hunt in a forest.

Fans of fine art might also want to dine in the British restaurant **Berners Tavern** in The London Edition hotel. A former ballroom, it has high ceilings, chandeliers and walls covered in gilt-framed landscapes and still-life images of flowers and fruit (*www.bernerstavern.com*).

Prefer sculpture? If dining eye to eye with a male nude is too much to stomach then eat at Mark Hix's **Tramshed** in Shoreditch instead, in

the shadow of Damien Hirst's *Cock and Bull* – a chicken and cow preserved in formaldehyde. You can also see Hirst's work at **Brasserie of Light** inside Selfridges. You can't miss his huge, crystal-encrusted statue of Pegasus, a winged horse which flies out of one wall (*www.hix restaurants.co.uk*; *www.brasserie-of-light.co.uk*).

Sexy Fish in Mayfair, meanwhile, serves sushi in sexy surroundings. Have a drink next to Hirst's mermaid statues and beneath carp sculptures, then eat tuna tataki under a ceiling decorated with seaweed (www.sexyfish.com).

Sketch in Mayfair is another arty spot. Every two years, an artist is given free rein to transform the Gallery, a pastel-pink restaurant with velvet banquettes. Currently, the Turner Prizenominated David Shrigley's satirical sketches line the walls (*www.sketch.london*). – Sarah Riches

Nightlife

A colourful evening

hether you want to drink among art or make art while you drink, London's nightlife scene is among the world's most creative. Where else can you enjoy a tipple in bars decorated with murals or street art?

Fans of graffiti should visit **HUCKSTER**, a multi-venue space for 400 near Little Venice. Its arty interior is a mash-up of styles with neon club signs, graffiti and Chinese lanterns. Ask a bartender to spin the wheel of fortune above the main bar, drink the results and get dancing to the DJ, or show off your moves on dancing poles in High Line, an '80s New York underground carriage (*www.hucksterlondon.co.uk*).

You can also see urban art in **Graphic Bar** in Soho, which features art by Turner Prize-winner Mark Wallinger as well as Ben Allen, Ben Eine and Jim Sharp – think alphabet prints and typeface on metal shutters. The bar has 305 types of gin and its drinks are as elaborate as its interiors – order a cocktail and it might arrive at your table in a paint tin, light bulb or glass skull (*www.graphicbar.com*).

The Devil's Darling

The Devil's Darling, in The Napoleon Hotel near Dennis Severs' House, has a mural in which a picture from inside a church has been graffitied over with alien-like characters. Manager Alex Francis says: 'We had a refurbishment in January, going from a clean and polished hotel bar aesthetic to a moody, more intimate cocktail bar. The mural – by art collective Republic ¥ – is over a print of the painting of Napoleon's Coronation by Jacques-Louis David.' The menu features just three classic cocktails a night (*www.napoleon-hotel.com*).

If you'd rather make art than just admire it, visit **Drink, Shop & Do** near King's Cross, which hosts events for creatives. This month you can make macramé plant hangers (16 Jun) or use fluorescent pastels to draw a model painted in glow-in-thedark neon (27 Jun; *www.drinkshopdo.co.uk*).

A tale of two cities

As 175,000 people flock to Somerset for Glastonbury Festival, **Sarah Riches** looks at two great musical cities

anchester was home to the Bee Gees, The Stone Roses and Oasis. But when it comes to music greats and legendary venues, Liverpool vies for the top spot, as the city spawned The Beatles, Gerry & the Pacemakers, Cream and The Cavern Club. So, in the battle of the bands, which city comes out on top?

MUSICAL HERITAGE

MANCHESTER

The Bee Gees put Manchester on the music map in the 1950s, back when they were known as The Rattlesnakes. They paved the way for rock bands Joy Division, 10cc and The Smiths, led by vocalist Morrissey.

At the same time, after the suicide of Joy Division's singer Ian Curtis and the demise of the band, the remaining members formed New Order with Gillian Gilbert, releasing *Regret, True Faith* and *Blue Monday* – and opening the legendary Haçienda nightclub in 1982. Simply Red, Lisa Stansfield and The Stone Roses were making it big then, too.

By the late '80s, Manchester's music scene was booming, and 'Madchester' – a blend of alternative rock, acid house and dance – was taking off at raves. The movement morphed into Britpop in the '90s, led by Manchester band Oasis. The '90s also heralded the Brit





Award and Mercury Prize-winning group M People, who became known for *Moving on Up, One Night in Heaven* and *Search for the Hero*.

They were all songs you'd listen to while getting ready to go out, as well as those by boy band Take That – unless you were more of an electronic music fan, in which case you'd listen to N-Trance and The Chemical Brothers. After Oasis split in 2009, fans had to wait until 2010 to listen to Noel Gallagher's High Flying Birds.

STORES OF

LIVERPOOL

Not to be outdone, Liverpool's music heritage dates back to the 1940s, with the arrival of Frankie Vaughan. The 1950s saw the opening of The Cavern Club, a jazz and blues joint that hosted Ronnie Scott, Paul McCartney and Richard Starkey, who was later better known as Ringo Starr.

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Of course, every music fan knows The Beatles hailed from Liverpool. If the '80s and '90s was Manchester's era, the '60s was Liverpool's, as while The Beatles' fame was rising, so was Cilla Black's, Gerry & the Pacemakers' and Billy Fury's, who, like The Beatles, had numerous hits that decade.

Fast forward to the '80s and teenagers across the country were telling their parents to *Relax* thanks to Frankie Goes to Hollywood – the single was banned by the BBC because of its sexual lyrics.

Come the '90s, just as The Haçienda in Manchester was attracting ravers, so was Cream in Liverpool. The local pop band Atomic Kitten made it big at the same time – so it's little wonder, then, that the *Guinness Book of Records* named Liverpool the City of Pop in 2001. Fellow Liverpudlian Rebecca Ferguson charmed audiences on the reality TV show *The X Factor* in 2010, helping the city to be labelled City of Music by UNESCO in 2015.

MUSIC VENUES

MANCHESTER

If you want to soak up the scene, listen to The Bridgewater Hall's resident orchestras, the BBC Philharmonic, Hallé and Manchester Camerata. There are also free lunchtime concerts at the Royal Northern College of Music and chamber music at The Stoller Hall, which opened in 2012. You can watch a musical at the 2,000-seat Manchester Opera House, too.

Pop fans can attend gigs at the O2 Apollo, Manchester Academy or Manchester Arena, which seats 21,000 – making it Europe's largest indoor arena. This month, catch Mumford & Sons (6 Jun), Backstreet Boys (10 Jun), The Eagles (26 Jun) and Westlife (28-29 Jun) at the Arena.

Prefer indie bands? Then listen to upcoming rock, reggae and folk acts at Band on the Wall, YES

Yoko Ono

and The Deaf Institute, a Grade II-listed music hall. If the acts inspire you to seek out new music, shop for vinyl at Piccadilly Records, Eastern Bloc and Vinyl Exchange in the Northern Quarter cultural district. You can also learn about the city's music scene on a Manchester Music Tour.



Magical

Mystery Tour

In Liverpool you can brush up on music facts on a Magical Mystery Tour about The Beatles or at The Beatles Story museum. The British Music Experience is also a must – see handwritten lyrics and Beatles memorabilia, practise dance moves taught by a virtual instructor, belt out tunes in a music booth and play electric guitars.

When it comes to music venues, Liverpool rivals Manchester. Liverpool Philharmonic Hall is the biggie; listen to Stereophonics' Kelly Jones (6 Jun), Mozart by the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra (8 Jun), The Music of John Williams (14-15 Jun) and Ministry of Sound (21 Jun).

You can also listen to big names at Eventim Olympia's former ballroom; The Smyths tribute band (1 Jun) at O2 Academy Liverpool, and Take That (6 Jun), Bon Jovi (19 Jun) and Pink (25 Jun) at Anfield Stadium. M&S Bank Arena, meanwhile, will host Mumford & Sons (2 Jun), the Grammy Award-winning Sean Paul (5 Jun), a Michael Jackson tribute (22 Jun) and Westlife (25-26 Jun). If you prefer intimate venues, then check out The Cavern Club – it moved location, but is still going strong 62 years after it opened. It has indie acts and resident bands including The Beatles tribute Made in Liverpool. Live venues Eric's Liverpool and SGT Peppers are on the same street. It's worth checking out the 19th-century

Arts Club Liverpool in the former Royal Institute of Arts & Science, too, as well as The Shankly Hotel, as its Garden of Eden rooftop hosts occasional gigs.

If Garden of Eden gives you a taste of the outdoors, attend Parklife in Heaton Park, a 600-acre space in Manchester (8-9 Jun).

Dance to rapper Cardi B, George Ezra, the electronic dance trio Major Lazer and Khalid.

Repeat visitors might also want to check out the biennial Manchester International Festival (4-21 Jul), which celebrates original work in venues across the city. Highlights include the world premiere of Yoko Ono's orchestra of bells and the Mercury Prize-winner Skepta performing in a secret location. At Sounds from the Other City (6-13 Jul) in Castlefield Bowl meanwhile, you can listen to the BBC Philharmonic and Grotbags.

LIVERPOOL

Over in Liverpool, you can dance to house, techno and grime at Baltic Weekender (to 2 Jun) in the Baltic Triangle district, which is now in

its third year. Nina Kraviz is the 2019 headliner. Global music fans, meanwhile, can listen to African tunes and Caribbean and Latin-American styles such as salsa, soca and reggae at Africa Oyé (22-23 Jun), a free annual festival in Sefton Park.

If your trip lasts all summer, then make time for Liverpool International Music Festival (20-21 Jul), which is also in Sefton Park. Drum and bass duo Sigma headline along with Disco Classical, an orchestra that performs disco classics.

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

















London Underground map







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
