# From PAGE TOSTAGE

It's hard to keep a good story to yourself, so it's no wonder that many leap off the page and onto the stage. **Sarah Riches** shines a spotlight on shows inspired by novels, films and TV series

hen a film or TV series gets people talking, a novel flies off the shelves or a single's downloads rocket, you know you're on to something. But if you missed the film on the big

screen, or can't wait for the novel's sequel, then you needn't miss out – see the story reinvented on the West End stage instead. Here are some of the best.

The inspiration: NOVELS

Susan Hill's 1983 novel, *The Woman in Black*, has all the trappings of a gripping horror: a funeral, a house shrouded in fog and eerie noises. It follows Arthur, a solicitor, as he settles the estate of a widow whose house is cut off from the mainland at high tide. While there, he hears a child scream and sees a mysterious woman in black. Who is she, and how will she affect him?

The novel inspired a play, which opened in 1987 in Scarborough, north Yorkshire. It transferred to the West End in 1989 and was released as a film that year, then again in 2012 starring Daniel Radcliffe.

The play's director, Robin Herford, says: 'People are always searching for new stories to tell, and often the inspiration for those stories comes from tales which exist in other formats. But if you've seen *The Woman in Black* film, you are in for a different experience when you see it on stage.

'As often happens with filmmakers, the original novel serves as a starting point for a creation, rather than a faithful retelling of the story. If you've read the novel, then you'll find the stage show satisfying and intriguing. The play celebrates what actors can do before your eyes and guarantees a memorable, if somewhat unsettling, experience that will stay with you long after you've left the theatre.' ►


Matilda is another classic 1980s novel which has jumped off the page. Roald Dahl's 1988 novel, illustrated by Quentin Blake, is one of his most popular stories. Children love the clever five year old who is trying to escape her unkind family. And who doesn't love a happy ending? The book became a film in 1996, starring Mara Wilson. In 2011, Tim Minchin wrote the music and lyrics for the West End musical, which has since won Olivier and Tony Awards.

Matildo

Victor Hugo's 1862 novel, *Les Misérables*, meanwhile, is epic: the English translation runs to 1,500 pages. Once you know the plot, you'll see why it's right for the stage, as it packs a punch. Set in the 1800s, it follows Jean Valjean after he's released from hard labour for committing a minor crime. Following the kindness of a stranger, he turns his life around and becomes a mayor – until a cruel police officer tries to ruin everything. The musical premiered in Paris in 1980 and came to the West End in 1985. It became a film in 2012, starring Hugh Jackman as Valjean.

The inspiration: FILM SCRIPTS

The film Aladdin, about a poor boy who finds a magic lamp with a genie inside it, was released in 1992. On paper, it was a recipe for success: Tim Rice co-wrote the lyrics, Disney created the animation and the genie was voiced by Robin Williams. No wonder it was the world's top earner that year. The story took to the stage in Seattle in 2011 and the West End in 2016 – wowing audiences with a flying carpet.



Its enduring popularity led to the story being given a new life in May, in a film directed by Guy Ritchie and starring Will Smith as the genie.

Another Disney animation, *The Lion King*, melted hearts in 1994 with its story about a lion cub who believes he's responsible for his father's death. The cast included Matthew Broderick, Rowan Atkinson and Whoopi Goldberg. The musical premiered in Minneapolis in 1997, with lyrics by Tim Rice and music by Elton John. It transferred to the West End two years later, where it's been ever since. A new Disney film hits UK screens this month, with the voices of Beyoncé, Seth Rogen and Chiwetel Ejiofor.

Meanwhile, the 2003 film *School of Rock* saw Jack Black star as Dewey, a loveable loser trying to make ends meet as a guitarist. After disguising himself as a teacher, he transforms his class into a rock band. A funny script and Craig Wedren's cracking soundtrack made it a hit, and it had all the right ingredients for the stage. It premiered on Broadway in 2015 and the West End a year later.

#### The inspiration: TV SCRIPTS

Fawlty Towers aired on TV between 1975 and 1979. Its rude hotel manager Basil, hapless Spanish waiter Manuel and bemused guests made audiences cry with laughter. In 1997 the series became an immersive production in Australia. With the audience as hotel guests, the show transferred to the West End in 2009. Alison Pollard-Mansergh co-wrote Faulty Towers: The Dining Experience

co-wrote *Faulty Towers: The Dining Experience* and starred as the hotel's lazy co-owner, Sybil, in the original theatre production.

So what's the appeal of a theatre production based on a TV show? Pollard-Mansergh says: 'Immersive theatre is increasingly being inspired by movies, TV series and novels because people are already attached to the stories and want to be involved in them. People are drawn to the idea of bringing their imagination to life.

'You are plunged in among the action and interact directly with Basil, Sybil and Manuel. It's an absolute must for any fan. Andrew Sachs, who played Manuel [in the TV series], came as an audience member and loved it – he had a 'Manuel-off' with our Manuel at the time, Leigh Keily, and the audience were in fits!' When *Fawlty Towers* finished, the comedy *Only Fools and Horses* took its TV crown. David Jason, Nicholas Lyndhurst and Lennard Pearce starred as a get-rich-quick family, which struck a chord with British audiences when it aired on TV between 1981

and 1991. The next version came in February, when it premiered in the West End.

#### The inspiration: MUSIC LYRICS

Everyone knows ABBA's 1975 single, Mamma Mia!, and who can't identify with a broken heart? So when the playwright Catherine Johnson teamed up with ABBA's Benny Andersson

and Björn Ulvaeus to create the musical *Mamma Mia!*, the only question is what took them so long?

Producer Judy Craymer says: 'My inspiration for *Mamma Mia!* the musical was ABBA's joyful storytelling anthems. The musical had to be celebratory to match ABBA's timeless hits. Their songs lent themselves to a story from a woman's point of view. I was especially inspired by *The Winner Takes It All*. It portrays such a rollercoaster of emotions and is the perfect centrepiece to a woman's story.' The musical premiered in the West End in 1999, inspiring a 2008 film with a 2018 sequel: *Mamma Mia! Here We Go Again*. What next, a book?

# THE GREAT LONDON SUMMER IKEALOCAL

Neil Simpson slaps on the sunscreen to show you how to stay cool in the capital





s the sun shines and the mercury rises, London comes to life. But when a city with a population of more than eight million comes to life, it can become a little bit busy (and sweaty). So, where can a visitor get insider tips on how a Londoner keeps cool, enjoys the outdoors and avoids crowd-surfing all the way to a refreshing drink? The answers lie here, with my guide to enjoying summer like a local.

Bōkan

First things first: my absolute mega-tip is that you should expect the weather to turn cold at any second (this is England, after all), so bring a blanket or your biggest, cosiest jumper with you, everywhere. You can thank me later.

#### ALFRESCO NO-NOS

As George Michael once sang: 'Let's go outside, in the sunshine.' Good idea! There's nothing that we love more than going alfresco when the sun comes out. If you'd like to see a Londoner in their natural habitat in summer, simply head to any central London pub with pavement space between 5.30pm and 7pm on a weekday for a lively, fun atmosphere. If you would like a relaxing evening however, do the opposite.

Many central London restaurants put a few tables and chairs outside when the temperature rises, but don't be fooled: you could end up sharing your dinner with traffic fumes, two metres from the gutter. To alfresco like a Londoner, I would suggest picking a high, lesser-known rooftop bar, finding a pretty, tucked-away restaurant courtyard or having a picnic in a park.

I regularly visit the Sky Garden in the City, at the top of the 'Walkie-Talkie' building. It's massive, free to enter and has a very long terrace with breathtaking views – visit during the middle of a work day to beat the queues. I would also suggest Bōkan in Canary Wharf. This 39th-floor bar is tricky to find, but that means you'll be sharing its brilliant drinks, huge terrace and impressive London vistas with fewer people.

#### SUMMERLIKE A LOCAL

I would urge you to visit hidden dining courtyards including Soho's Ham Yard, Kingly Court off Carnaby Street, Hoxton Square near Old Street and Bleeding Heart Yard in Farringdon. Other favourites are Kenwood on Hampstead Heath, Frederick's in Islington's Camden Passage, Gallery Mess next to the Saatchi Gallery in Chelsea, Pop Brixton and, finally, Ognisko in Exhibition Road, which is convenient for South Kensington's museums.

If you do choose to picnic in a London park, you'll be spoilt for choice – but don't forget, if you discover any areas filled with deckchairs, there's a charge to sit in them.

My top tip is to catch the Overground to Haggerston in east London. I used to live there and the canal is a superb place to spend a lazy day in the sun. You'll find lots of unusual waterside cafés and restaurants (the Venezuelan Arepa & Co is my favourite) and it's a good example of the creative shabbiness that Hackney is loved for. www.skygarden.london; www.bokanlondon.co.uk; www.arepaandco.com

food and drinks on sale. I usually choose Vauxhall Pleasure Gardens because even though it's close to Vauxhall station, the screen is in a big field and the traffic feels far away. It usually shows light-hearted classics (I watched *Ferris Bueller's Day Off* last year). You can see this summer's choices online.

Another great outdoor screen that I discovered last year is adjacent to Granary Square in King's Cross (to 14 Jul). The entire area was recently redeveloped and includes amphitheatre-style seats that descend to a canal, with the screen installed on the opposite bank; if you sit in the front row, you'll get to meet swans and ducks as they float past. Films are shown every day

and evening and key Wimbledon tennis matches are screened, too. It's all free, but you do need to book tickets online in advance to secure a space. www.vauxhall one.co.uk; www.kings cross.co.uk

#### OUTDOOR CINEMA

Sky Garden

#### **TUBE SURVIVAL 101**

During a heatwave, the London Underground is not your friend. It retains heat that stays down there for days, which means that even if the rain clouds have arrived outside, deep in the bowels of London it's sweaty. During last summer's heatwave, I watched a tourist concentrate hard on not passing out while she was on the Central line. So, if it's very hot outside and you can avoid the Tube, I recommend doing so.

Of course, that is not always an option, so my Top Hot Tube Tips are: pull the windows down between the train carriages, which lets in lots of air, and stand near them; definitely avoid rush hour, which is approximately 7.30am-9.30am and 5pm-6.30pm; carry a fan; the hottest Tube line is the Bakerloo line, followed by the Central line, so try to avoid those in the heat.

#### TUBE ALTERNATIVES

How does a Londoner skip the Underground during a heatwave? That depends on where you live, but as I live in Stratford I cannot avoid the Central line. If I lived close to the Thames, I would use river services. Download the Citymapper app, which gives you journey suggestions for wherever you wish to go, including boats.

London's River Bus is provided by MBNA Thames Clippers and it's inexpensive. To travel east from Westminster to Greenwich costs an adult about £7 with an Oyster card. Alternatively, use the buses, sit at the top (the bottom deck is roasting) and push the windows open.

Londoners often say that this city rewards walkers: there's so much packed in that you could pick one area and spend a day there, which means that you'll minimise humid public transport time. www.citymapper.com; www.thamesclippers.com

#### HERE COMES THE SUN

London gets hot, hot, hot, but it's not just about temperature: the sun's still going to reach you in this building-stuffed metropolis, so wear at least 30 SPF sunscreen

#### SUMMER-FRIENDLY NEIGHBOURHOODS

#### Paddington

It's not just a train station! The Grand Union Canal runs through it. You can enjoy floating restaurants, try paddleboarding or even hire a boat and sail it yourself with GoBoat London. Then you can stroll to Little Venice, which is as pretty as its name suggests.

#### Hampstead

Most Londoners can only dream of a garden, so it's no surprise that we love Hampstead Heath: being removed from the city means that it's a little calmer and there's more room to roam. Explore the beautiful Hill Gardens surrounding Hampstead Pergola, enjoy culture at Keats House, or swim in the Heath's natural ponds for a few pounds.

#### **London Fields**

For a slice of the millennial Londoner life, explore the E8 postcode: London Fields fizzes with activity during the summer, thanks to its large park, lido (this is the British word for a public, open-air swimming pool) and proximity to Broadway Market. Hackney Council recently banned personal barbecues here, but the nearby borough of Islington permits them in all of its parks.

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# As London Planner turns 35, **Sarah Riches** delves into its past

**1984** was a dramatic year: it started with a hurricane, a miners' strike led to violent confrontations, and the much-loved comedian Tommy Cooper died on stage at Her Majesty's Theatre.

But it wasn't all bad news: the year also saw Andrew Lloyd Webber's hit musical *Starlight Express* premiered at the Apollo Victoria Theatre; the Queen opened the Thames Barrier in Greenwich, which is designed to protect London from floods; Everton won the FA Cup at Wembley and Princess Diana gave birth to Prince Harry.

It was also the year that *London Planner* was born, in July – just as Frankie Goes to Hollywood's *Two Tribes* was topping the charts. Early issues had just 20 or so pages and were printed in black and white, but like today they still featured handy listings for sights, theatre, sports and museums and galleries, as well as a useful Theatreland map.

Much has changed since then – for London and *London Planner*. We've since introduced a welcome letter from the Mayor of London, more pages and features, sections dedicated to shopping, eating out and nightlife, plus bus, boat and Tube maps. There's also a section called Britain Planner, which inspires you to take trips out of the capital. And it's all still free.

Loyal readers might remember our souvenir issues to mark the Queen's Diamond Jubilee (Jun-Jul 2012); the London Olympics (Jul-Aug 2012) and London Paralympics (Aug-Sep 2012).



White Drawing Room at Buckingham Palace

## From one queen to another

The mighty doors to London's most famous dwelling swing open this month, inviting the general public to peek into the world of Queen Elizabeth II. If you dream of stepping inside **Buckingham Palace**, here's your chance.

This year's **Summer Opening** (from 20 Jul; p. 31) includes an exhibition marking 200 years since the birth of the Queen's great-great grandmother, Victoria. *Queen Victoria's Palace* looks at how the young monarch transformed the palace from an unfinished, partially decorated monolith into a national focal point.

Like Elizabeth, Victoria ascended the throne at a young age and quickly moved to her new home from Kensington Palace. The exhibition illustrates her youth with a portrait by Thomas Sully, which was completed while she was a teenage queen.

Victoria married Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha at the age of 20. Seventeen years and nine children later, Buckingham Palace was starting to feel a bit cramped for such a large family – it hasn't always been the massive, four-sided structure that you see today. After £70,000 was raised, the East Wing was finished in 1849, closing the square and introducing Buckingham Palace's now-famous balcony.

Aside from *Queen Victoria's Palace*, the *Summer Opening* of Buckingham Palace is a real treat. Ticketholders are granted access to the 19 state rooms and the tour ends as they enter the beautiful garden, covering 160,000sqm and the scene of many royal garden parties.

If you are considering visiting Kensington Palace during your trip, then you may not be surprised to find out that it is also celebrating Victoria's 200th birthday, too. 

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

## I spy with my little eye..

ead to the **Science Museum** this summer for an exciting, free exhibition exploring UK spies, ciphers and cyber security. **Top Secret** (from 10 Jul; p. 72) will detail the history of communications intelligence over the past century, including the advent of cyber security, as well as what to expect from the future.


Designed to offer a unique and informative experience to people of all ages, *Top Secret* will appeal to anyone who wishes to learn more about intelligence agencies. It's being held to mark the first 100 years of Government Communications Headquarters (GCHQ), which is the UK's intelligence, security and cyber agency.

Declassified files and artefacts from the private collections of the Science Museum Group and

GCHQ will be displayed, with some being shown to the public for the first time. The exhibition charts the development of gadgets and devices used for intelligence gathering over the years and explores how GCHQ keeps UK residents safe, what it takes to maintain digital security today and the challenges that operatives face.

Visitors will also be able to explore the story behind the breaking of the German Enigma code during World War II at Bletchley Park near Milton Keynes, which was famously led by Alan Turing. This period of history will also be shown from the Nazi perspective, with the inclusion of an Enigma M1070 machine captured by Britain in 1945.

Another object featured is the Pickwick secure telephone system. This innocent-looking red



telephone was used to conduct highly sensitive conversations between President Kennedy and Prime Minister Harold Macmillan during the 1962 Cuban Missile Crisis. It includes a small plaque that reads 'speech is secure only when lamp glows'.

Children (and big kids) will enjoy taking part in *Top Secret*'s interactive challenges, which are key to the end goal of this exhibition: GCHQ's director Jeremy Fleming explains that 'this exhibition is critical to inspire the next generation of cyber security and STEM skills [science, technology, engineering and maths] experts'.

## A hidden gem in London



ound between Covent Garden and Holborn Tube stations, the Museum of Freemasonry is a hidden gem in central London. Based in Freemasons' Hall, one of the capital's original Art Deco landmark buildings, the museum tells the story of freemasonry through its unique collection.

Did you know freemasons have been at Great Queen Street for almost 300 years? In what is the third Freemasons' Hall on this street, the Grade II-listed building that stands today is the home of English Freemasonry and houses one of the world's important collections.

Open to the public from Monday to Saturday, with free entry, you can discover the history of this social and charitable organisation through the colourful regalia and curious objects on display. Freemasons love to decorate everything they own with a hidden language of symbols and pictures, so this collection includes silver, glass, ceramics and furniture, as well as paintings, jewellery and books.

Between the two galleries and library, you can wander around the museum enjoying the friendly atmosphere and learn about the Grand Master's gigantic gold throne, originally built for the Prince of Wales, who later became King George IV. How about the badges made using scrap metal? These were created by British freemasons who managed to meet while in Changi Prison, Singapore, during World War II. There are fine examples of 18th-century craft on display too, such as the hand-stitched aprons worn during lodge meetings in bawdy taverns, where masons including the poet Robert Burns and the American patriot Benjamin Franklin would gather.

We welcome all visitors to the museum, so no, you won't need to know a special handshake to enter. So come in, enjoy the museum, join a free daily tour and explore an intricate history brought to light.





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

### Seasoned stars

s the pristine courts of Wimbledon throw open their doors again for this summer's **Wimbledon Championships** (1-14 Jul; p. 93), it looks likely that it will be the old favourites lifting the famous trophy.

It seems that our own former champion, Andy Murray, has played his last major tournament, after being forced to retire from the game due to injury. His older brother Jamie, however, will be gunning for glory in the men's and mixed doubles.

There are many more global evergreen players who show few signs of hanging up their rackets. A huge favourite in SW19, Roger Federer has amassed his own set of fans, known as 'Fed heads', who will no doubt be fluttering their Swiss flags with pride as the star looks to win an astounding ninth Wimbledon title, already winning his 100th overall title earlier this year. At almost 38 years old, he shows no signs of fading.

The women's game is more

open, with some pundits predicting a comeback for Petra Kvitová, who was hurt in a knife attack in 2016. And don't write off Serena Williams, who is looking for her eighth singles Wimbledon title, in her 22nd consecutive Championships.

Or perhaps it's time for the young guns to make their mark. Watch out for 20-year-old Greek Stefano Tsitsipas, who knocked out Federer in January's Australian Open. Or maybe Naomi Osaka, 21, will repeat her success of beating Serena Williams in the US Open final last year.

Following the success of the retractable roof on Centre Court, visitors to this year's event will see the new roof on Court No.1. With London's unpredictable weather, it should minimise disruption for the major matches. – *Emma Levine*

### Bring the outside in

espite its global reputation for poor weather, London shines in summer. So when the sun comes out, why not make the most of it by dining inside a conservatory? One of my favourites is in The Landmark London near Regent's Park. The five-star, Grade II-listed hotel opened in 1899 as the Grand Central Hotel and it's just as grand today. Its Winter Garden restaurant is in a covered courtyard. The original roof was much lower than it is now; it was removed before being put back on in 1991 to create an eight-storey atrium and it now bursts with natural light. The Winter Garden is home to 13 real, freeze-dried palm trees from Florida. Listen to a pianist or harpist as you dine on yellowfin tuna tartare, chicken breast with hispi cabbage or a Wimbledon-themed afternoon tea (1-14 Jul), which goes well with a cup of mango midsummer tea (www.landmarklondon.co.uk).

The Quince Tree Café at Clifton Nurseries near Little Venice has a more casual feel to it but it's just as pretty, with mismatched furniture and watering cans and plants that hang from the glass ceiling. The garden centre's café is open for breakfast, lunch and afternoon tea. Most dishes are light, including the roasted vegetable, feta and herb fritters with tomato salsa (*www.clifton.co.uk*).

On the other side of town is the **Barbican**, an arts centre. Looking at its Brutalist architecture, you wouldn't guess it hides a pretty conservatory, which is open on select Sundays (21 & 28 Jul). Take a stroll around the raised walkways,

The Quince Tree Café fountains and ponds with terrapins and carp, or go for afternoon tea. All dishes are made with fruit, flowers or herbs grown in the conservatory. You'll dine among 2,000 species of tropical plants and trees, including vines, palms, Swiss cheese plants and coffee

## Pubs with parks

s it just me, or do you think parks reveal a city's personality? In Mexico, people ballroom dance in public squares; in China they do tai chi and in London, we drink. I won't dwell on what that says about us, but I will tell you my favourite park pubs so that you can experience British culture.

The Queen's, by Primrose Hill, is a proper British pub. After taking in the view of London Zoo, the London Eye and The Shard from the top of the hill, stroll to the bottom and nab a table on the pub's terrace, which overlooks Regent's Park. If that's full, there are tables on the pavement.

Order a craft beer, Bloody Mary or Pimm's. Food-wise, the upstairs dining room serves British cuisine such as Devon crab with pickled fennel and epic Sunday roasts, while at night there's live music on Sundays and a Monday quiz downstairs (www.thequeensprimrosehill.co.uk). **Greenwich Tavern** is a classic. This dog-friendly pub has stools outside with views of Greenwich Park and a spruced-up courtyard with a flower wall. Order Meantime lager – made at Meantime Brewery down the road (which you can tour) – or Camden Hells, which is served from a pump that looks like a telephone box. You can sip gin cocktails with rose petals, too (*www.greenwichtavern.co.uk*).

The **Crooked Billet**, meanwhile, is right on Wimbledon Common, and its hanging baskets burst with pink and orange petunias in summer. You can play chess and on Sundays order a roast piled so high your Yorkshire pudding threatens to fall off your plate. When the sun is out, grab a pint of cask ale and sip it on the common, watching a game of cricket. It doesn't get more British than that (*www.thecrookedbilletwimbledon.com*). - Sarah Riches

# The **Pride** Britain

With Pride festivities in full swing, **Neil Simpson** takes a look at places beyond the capital that are celebrating, too



ou've chosen to visit London at the height of Pride season, so if you're planning a trip beyond the capital, why not make time for a Pride-friendly landmark or two? Here's a look at UK attractions that hold significance for Britain's LGBTQI+ (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, intersex and more) community.

### CANAL STREET, MANCHESTER

Before LGBTQI+ Manchester, there was Madchester. This cultural movement emerged in the late 1980s, as local musicians began blending alt rock with acid house and dance (no wonder they used the word 'mad'). As Manchester evolved to become a beacon of creativity and fun for north-west England, its gay community grew.

LGBTQI+ people received a harsher reception in the industrialised north of England than in the south, which made parts of Manchester buzzing safe havens. In 1991, the city became home to the UK's first glass-fronted gay bar. Called Manto (formed from the words 'Manchester' and 'today'), it represented a milestone for the nation. Manto was on Canal Street and before long, the whole area transformed into one of the UK's hottest gay villages. It was immortalised as the backdrop for *Queer as Folk*, a groundbreaking UK TV show that generated headlines when it was broadcast in 1998. Written by Russell T Davies (who went on to write BBC's relaunched *Doctor Who* from 2005 onwards), *Queer as Folk* brought Canal Street a new level of fame and today, it stands as a true gay landmark for Britain. These days, the area is commercialised and its dedicated LGBTQI+ venues are closing as the rest of Manchester becomes increasingly welcoming, but Canal Street is still an essential destination. *www.canal-st.co.uk* 

### THE LESBIAN ARCHIVE, GLASGOW

Here is some fantastic news for anyone with XX chromosomes, no matter their sexual identity: Glasgow has its very own Women's Library. It is the only one in the United Kingdom that has been accredited and four years ago, the library was also awarded the status of **>**

being a 'Recognised Collection of National Significance' by the Scottish government. The library emerged in 1991, thanks in no small part to Glasgow becoming European Capital of Culture in 1990. It boasts mountains of books, as well as a museum and an archive.

The library's Lesbian Archive contains numerous items from the past 100 years, including the back catalogues of publications such as *Arena Three*, *Outrage* and *Pink Paper*, alongside rare books and records relating to the UK's first organisation for black lesbians: the Camden Lesbian Centre and Black Lesbian Group.

## BLETCHLEY PARK, MILTON KEYNES

If Bletchley Park sounds familiar but you're not sure why, it might be because you've seen *The Imitation Game*, a film about code breaker Alan Turing starring Benedict Cumberbatch.

Set in Bletchley Park, it tells the story of what happened there during World War II, when a team worked to decipher the coded messages being sent between the Nazis. These codes included Enigma, which was thought to be unbreakable. Turing was homosexual and, due to the laws of the day, he was forced to undergo hormonal treatment to reduce his sexual urges and eventually committed suicide in 1954.

Due to the major part that Turing played in the Allied victory, he has become an icon for LGBTQI+ struggles, making Bletchley Park a key location at which to honour that fight. The site, with an impressive mansion at its heart, houses exhibitions and wartime artefacts. There's also a centre dedicated to the cracking of Enigma. www.bletchleypark.org.uk

## ALTHORP HOUSE, NORTHAMPTON

This majestic stately home has been the seat of Britain's noble Spencer family for five centuries. Sir John Spencer grazed his sheep here from 1486, buying the estate in 1508. Just in case you haven't guessed yet – this is the family that Diana, Princess of Wales was born into.

Diana made a huge, positive difference to the perception of people suffering from AIDS across the world. A little island in the middle of a lake in the grounds is Diana's resting place, making Althorp a landmark in the UK's LGBTQI+ story.

The Althorp House opening season (1 Jul to 31 Aug) permits access to the house's state rooms, so this is a great time to visit. Like stepping on to the set of *Downton Abbey*, the rooms are as ornate and grand as you might hope, especially the gold and royal blue state dining room. Outside, 550 acres of grounds include ancient oak trees, a herd of rare black fallow deer and Diana's lake, the Round Oval. *www.spencerofalthorp.com*

No guide to LGBTQI+ Britain is complete without a mention of Brighton, which most people will tell you is the UK's unofficial gay capital. It's also home to *The Museum of Transology* exhibition at Brighton Museum. Running until October, the exhibition includes items donated by the trans community and reveals stories about life as a trans person in England. One of the museum's other exhibitions, *Queer Looks* (to Dec), explores local LGBTQI+ fashion and style. The Piers & Queers walking tour takes you to

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
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
