This is a group exhibition celebrating more than 30 international artists whose work explores and engages with gender fluidity, as well as non-binary, trans and intersex identities. National Maritime Museum, 19 July 2019

Celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of humanity's first footsteps on another world on 21 July 2019, Royal Museums Greenwich will mount a major exhibition to explore our evolving relationship with the Moon across history. The exhibition will show that the Moon has always acted as a mirror for humanity's dreams, obsessions and endeavours.
